Executive Summary

About our management Kandivli Education Society

Some of the visionary philanthropists of Kandivli a suburbs of Mumbai city, way back in 1936, came together to form this society with the idea of passing on the invaluable gift of education to the children of Gujarati community in particular and other communities in general who had settled in this part of Mumbai. KES has a vision of being an outstanding education provider in the heart of an outstanding learning community as the number of students has grown drastically from mere 13 to 18000 over 79 years, the society has significantly increased the provision for higher education giving students greater access to degrees at the doorsteps. Its purpose is to foster critical thinking, free the mind of parochialism and prejudices while preparing students to lead personally satisfying, civically responsible and socially useful life.

A string of educational institutions took birth under the aegis of KES to cater to some of the growing needs of the community. In 1989, its lofty hood was yet again adorned with another plume when KES Shroff College of Arts and Commerce commenced its journey, and since then, it has been an incredible venture for KESSC for more than twenty five years. At present, the society has under its umbrella, 7 institutions from pre primary to PG & Ph.D. programme.

About the College

Where "Character is Destiny" and destiny of the country lies in the hands of able, energetic youngsters who are the edifice on which our College stands tall. Being accredited with 'A' grade by NAAC and an ISO 9001: 2008 certified institution, KESSC has completed 27 glorious years of igniting the flame of academic excellence through campus discipline, fair and transparent administration and an outstanding and committed faculty who excel in their roles as facilitators and scholars. The teachers work in tandem with students with mutual respect as they keep on motivating the diverse body of students, challenging them to the limits of their abilities. In order to equip the students to face the ever evolving corporate world and following the *cafeteria approach* we have 11 Degree Courses namely BA, B. Com., BAF, BBI, BFM, BMM, BMS, B.Sc. IT, BEM, BIM, BAFTM and 5 Post Graduate courses i.e. M.Com. in Advanced Accountancy, M.Com. in Management, MA in Business Economics, MA in Film, Television and New Media Production & M.Sc. IT. The College also has a Ph.D. programme centre in Commerce affiliated to University of Mumbai and another in Business Economics is in the offing. We are also offering 8

certificates and diploma courses and have tie-ups with FINPLAN for Association of Chartered Company Accountants (ACCA), Ambition Solutions for Skill Upgradation, with Kashida Fashion Institute for fashion designing and professional coaching classes for CA, CPT & CS. A certificate course on digital learning, animation, graphics, film technology and media studies through Academy of Digital Arts (ADA).

Basking in the glory of the accomplishment of the previous accreditation, we present the RAR, mapping our efforts, initiatives, sustaining and assuring quality in the field of education, which is quintessential. This report is the reflection of sustainable measures and innovative practices evolved within the institute over a period of four years in completion.

Criteria - I

With a view to integrating its educational programs with the institutional goals and ensuing objectives, we have espoused certain perspectives aligning our vision and mission and have employed various means of communication and technology for ensuring the fullest dissemination of the messages encapsulated in our vision, mission and objectives. The dynamic website www.kesshroffcollege.commakes visible all the necessary information to all the stakeholders. Meticulously formulated teaching plans ensure effective transaction of curricular contents of the courses. The calendar of events guides the conduct of co curricular and extracurricular activities. The students are holistically oriented towards issues reflecting scientific temper, ethics, human values, traditions, culture, integrity, harmony, civic sense, human rights etc., so that they imbibe them into their core persona. The spirit of teamwork is consciously driven into the collective psyche of the students by means of activities like projects, exhibitions, 11 intercollegiate festivals, 3 intercollegiate sport events, field visits, study tours etc. Few teachers are involved in the curriculum design of the affiliating university. We try to enrich and yet remain flexible within the limitations set by the syllabus setting of the university.

Criteria - II

Our teaching learning system has stayed true to the spirit of cooperative learning strategies where the facilitator and the learner stay together in the process of mutual learning. We continue to strive to learn together in service, accompanying the learner at every step. Our efforts are always on to make classroom teaching interesting by adopting meticulous forms of blended learning systems, flipped classroom pedagogy along with traditional teaching. Embracing technology for knowledge dissemination

and speedy communication has become a regular feature in classrooms. Staff and infrastructural appraisal by students is solicited through a structured feedback mechanism thus enabling continuous improvement.

Criteria - III

To, inculcate the spirit of enquiry, critical thinking and to promote research culture amongst students, research projects are introduced both at UG and PG level and necessary facilities are provided for the same in the learning resource centre. Exposure to the learning resources like Massive Open Online Course Materials (MOOC), research methodology programme, visit to industries, summer internships encourage students to think innovatively. Making research a priority, teachers are encouraged to undertake minor research projects, present papers in conferences and publish the same. In the last four years 174 papers have been published, 20 minor research projects have been undertaken and 21 numbers of books are authored. The discerning feature of our College is, holding a students' research conference - a conference of the students, by the students and for the students wherein only students from our College and other colleges are invited to present research papers on a fix date i.e. 4th of September every year and the best paper presented is rewarded. Organizing international, national seminar and conferences is an annual feature, promoting research culture amongst staff and students alike. Informal consultancy by our teachers to other colleges and organizations is also undertaken. Three professors are approved research guides and we have a research centre in commerce and another research centre in economics is in the offing by the university. The Research Advisory Committee takes charge of this endeavor. Six research scholars are already selected for PhD programme in commerce. Some of the teachers have been awarded the best paper presentation award at the conferences and seminars.

Our extension activities undertaken through the NSS, NCC, DLLE, Social Impact Committee and NGOs know no bounds. Community oriented programmes are note worthy features with more than 500 activities in the last 4 years. A good number of awareness and training programmes rallies, street plays, blood donation camps, visits to orphanage, old age homes, health check up camps have been organized on regular basis. **Platelet donation** and participation in **River March** i.e. sensitizing people on the importance of rivers, is a unique activity undertaken by our staff and students.

Fulfilling one of the national objectives i.e. Swachhata Abhiyaan, we undertook the responsibility of beautifying and cleaning of platform no. 1 of Kandivli Railway Station, spending Rs. 5.93 Lakhs for the same. This activity was a feather in our cap of extension activity well appreciated and applauded by the society and Indian Railways. Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension (DLLE) undertakes

literacy drive in the society, teaching the illiterate and the less literate, the three 'R's to them i.e. Reading, Writing and Arithmetic specially to students of municipal schools in the vicinity.

Community oriented programmes are noteworthy features of the College in the last four years Rotaract club of the College has also contributed a lot in extension activities. The NSS unit has bagged the best College award for the same. Professor in charge of NCC received an appreciation letter from Gr. Commander, NCC Mumbai 'A' Group for organizing the first international yoga day in an exemplary manner.

Criteria - IV

All our developmental efforts are envisaged and geared in accordance with the infrastructure policies of the College. 57 ICT enabled classrooms enrich the whole teaching learning experience. The latest addition of annexe building to our campus showcases state of the art infrastructure. A huge playground is the envy of many in the vicinity as in Mumbai it is a luxury to have the same. One big multipurpose hall, 2 auditoriums, conference room, 2 a spacious canteens, 2 girls' and boys' common room, 5 computer labs with licensed software, media room, geography lab, language lab and air-conditioned gymkhana are our pride.

Our knowledge research Centre – the Library is a dynamic repertoire of digital and hard intellectual resources, which connect the students to the global network of knowledge and information making them comparable to their counterparts anywhere in the world. The saying 'Information at fingertips' is realized by a well stacked air conditioned library having its own website, treasured with books, journals, audio visual resources, and case studies, autobiographies, encyclopedias, databases and free internet access, all supported by Web OPAC. Recent addition of a 'Kindle Laboratory' is a step ahead for the same enabling free access to thousands of e-books. Keeping in mind the needs of the physically challenged students, elevators and ramps, wheel chairs and special toilets are provided.

Criteria – V

Assuring a positive learning ambition - The College strategizes the pine approach i.e. plan, implement, monitor and evaluate. Believing in 'brick to click approach' a hassle free entry to the students is enabled via online admission process along with payment gateway through its website 'www.kessconline.com'. A sea of information is published in the prospectus, both in hard and soft forms, giving details about the College, events, code of conduct, syllabus, examination pattern, welfare schemes and scholarships, facilities along with vision, mission and objectives. The academic

performance of the College has been consistently above the university average and much above the passing percentage of the colleges in the vicinity. To build competency and inculcate employability skills among students, the College has established K-Skool since 2013-14, which is a graduate skilled programme to prepare students for corporate jobs. Its mentor being paid a handsome salary of Rs. 1,00,000/-per month.

Entrepreneurial Development Cell is formed to hone the skills of budding entrepreneurs. Career Guidance Cell conducts career fairs and guidance activity for enhancing placements. Our placement record is quite satisfactory. 33 Committees and Associations and National and International exposure visits enable students to develop a holistic personality. Calling icons to the campus, viz. Mr. Yashwant Sinha, Ex-Finance Minister, Gujarati litterateur. Mr. Raghuveer Choudhari, recently awarded with Gyanpeeth award and the likes, expose our students to their competencies. Frequent interactions with successful alumni are arranged to motivate and orient students about career planning and life skills. Caring for the students, the College provides fee exemptions, concessions, installment facilities, reprography facility, as students support endeavour. Committed to bring down the drop-out rate, our management has initiated the 'Vidyotejak Scheme', which we proudly mark as our best practice. Each year, almost Rs. Nine Lacs is paid as fees to the economically weak students. Advance learners taking care of slow learners through the 'Peer Buddy System' in each class is a distinguishing feature. Special concern, care and comfort bestowed upon physically challenged students by our students, teaching and non-teaching staff is worth mentioning. This year, the College arranged to give electronic wheel chairs worth Rs. 2.42 Lacs to two physically challenged ex-students. For the in-house, 'divyang' students, ramps, elevators, lifts and special toilets are Students are very much a part of the College administration and provided. functioning as few are the members of the students' council and others are nominated to various Committees, Associations and Forums. They are encouraged to exhibit their creativity through College magazines and newsletters / bulletins of various associations, which progresses into content writing and copy writing skills. Sending students to various intercollegiate festivals, sports meet and other activities at the national and international level has improved their competency traits. In the past 4 years, in cultural category alone, our students have won 130 prizes. Our Cine and Dramatic Team has won the first prize at the All India National Level Theatre Competition at Christ University, Bangalore, one of our students won the second prize at Tech-Fest, IIT, Mumbai. In sports, we have won 158 prizes in total. 2 gold medals at international level and 14 university level 9 at state level. All this is a result of full financial support given to students. Two of our students were motivated to present research papers at an International Conference at Thailand and Sri Lanka with complete financial support from the College.

Another feather in our cap is, that in each of the last 4 years, at least one of our student is successfully completing the **Chartered Accountancy (CA) course**, when the All India pass percentage is less than 1. One of our students has attained 17th rank at the All India level in the Company Secretary (CS) exam. One of our NCC cadets has joined the Indian Army recently.

A counselor, a spacious and reasonably priced canteen, girls and boys common rooms, free internet facility, ragging free campus, women development and empowerment cell, installation of sanitary pads dispensing machine and incinerator etc. are all students support measures implemented, ending in meaningful support.

Criteria - VI

The governance model practiced at the institution is based on the time-tested tenets of mutual trust, transparency and decentralization with accountability at every level. The management believes in bottom up approach by allowing a free flow of ideas and sharing of experiences with a special focus on operational efficiency and cumulative growth in the whole planning and implementation process. The growth of the institution and the satisfaction of the stakeholders are ensured through strategic planning with clearly defined long term and short-term goals ascertained through free and open sharing of thoughts and ideas. A harmonious relationship exists amongst the students, staff and the management. As the institution is in the trajectory of growth, the future developmental agenda is clearly chalked out in the annual brain storming sessions held at a meeting of the Principal and the Heads of the Departments. In turn, HODs conduct departmental meetings and the developmental measures are implemented within the institution.

The major targets of growth plan for the next ten years include strengthening and addition of new PG courses, introduction of interdisciplinary choice based programmes, MOUs with other academic bodies, academy industry linkages, faculty and student exchange programmes and up gradation of research work.

Criteria - VII

A conscientious effort is followed in the College to preserve the environment for prosperity and the students and the staff is sensitized towards the same. A clean and green campus, conservation of energy and nature by way of installing solar panel, installing capacitor bank for controlling power factor, rainwater harvesting at two different levels are the steps taken. Turning waste into energy, composting waste and

quality monitoring of air, water are integral part of the College functioning. Energy audit and green audit is undertaken. E-waste management, plantation drive and, over and above all, initiating a 'Certificate Course on Environmental Education' is a step towards making students' environment conscious. Taking students for Nature Trails and having a bonsai, herbal and medicinal plantation, terrarium garden etc. are some of the additional features to develop and nurture environmental consciousness and awareness. Organizing essay writing and poster making competitions, holding exhibitions on topics like 'Be Aware, Use Energy with Care', 'Save the Polar, go Solar', 'Save a Watt, to save a lot' instills consciousness thereby helping in reducing carbon footprints.

Thinking out of the box and doing something different is a step towards innovation in which we strongly believe. The Flipped Classroom Concept, the Kindle Lab, the Digital Locker Facility and the Optical Mark Recognition (OMR) System of Attendance record keeping are some of the innovations introduced. Drawing a happiness index of all stakeholders, putting up an information kiosk and having the Band App Connectivity, as a means of *Student Connect Initiative* with the authorities are some of the innovative and discerning features of the College.

A proactive management, dedicated staff with a flair for innovations, focused students, responsible parents; enthusiastic alumni and responsive local community are the invincible strengths enabling the institution to keep pace with developmental needs to meet the challenges and massification of higher education.

The vision, mission and goals are very clearly spelt out in the **prospectus**, **annual magazine**, **website** of the institution, various printed material and journals. The vision and mission are displayed prominently at the **entrance** of the institution, in the principal's cabin, office library, staffroom, gymkhana, IQAC, laboratories, conference room, on **every floor** and in every **classroom**. Also in the orientation sessions of the first year students, the vision and mission are clearly communicated. During the induction session of the new teaching and non-teaching staff the vision, mission and objectives are put across. During parent teachers' meeting, the same is highlighted in the principal's address.

Core Value:

"Character is destiny" is the core value that we promote and try to instill in our students. Abraham Lincoln said, "Reputation is the shadow. Character is the tree." Our character is much more than just what we try to display for others to see, it is who we are, even when no one is watching. It is our character and character alone, that is all that really passes for destiny. With this core value and notion, our entire KES family is constantly in the process of moulding the character of students.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

- Being affiliated to the University of Mumbai, we are not directly involved in the development of the curricula
- At the beginning of the academic year, academic calendar is prepared by the academic calendar committee on the basis of the schedule of term given by the university
- The learners are introduced to the subjects of their respective courses through the prospectus &College website
- Meetings of the respective departments are convened to charter a plan for the successful and timely implementation of the curriculum. The Head of the departments discuss and deliberate with their respective department members and chalk out a plan to distribute the workload keeping in mind the expertise and experience of the faculty members

- Timetable is prepared for each course for effective distribution of workload and the same is displayed on the notice boards and website
- The teachers then follow the **teaching plan** and also ensure timely completion of the syllabus.
- The syllabus is communicated through handouts as well as printed in the **textbooks**. The timetable is put up on the **notice boards** and **website**
- The faculty members make an attempt to ensure that courses are completed on time and extra lectures are arranged if needed. **Remedial lectures** are also conducted
- Learners are encouraged and motivated to participate in academic competitions at various levels viz. Mathema quiz, book review, quizonomics, online and offline aptitude test etc. They are also motivated to participate in research based activities conducted by various departments and are assigned projects which they successfully carry out under the guidance of respective teachers
- The feedback regarding the effective completion of the syllabus for every subject is taken from the students and the same is communicated to the respective subject teachers
- Innovative pedagogy like making use of ICT techniques, flipped classrooms, group discussions, case studies etc. along with the traditional chalk and talk method are applied in the classroom
- The teaching faculty is provided with Laptops and all the classrooms are equipped with projectors.
- The process of continuous evaluation of the students by regular internal tests and semester exams is followed
- The IQAC of the College monitors the effective implementation of curriculum represented.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The University reframes its syllabus from time to time to match the current trends and sets the **academic calendar** for the colleges. Syllabus acquaintance workshops are also conducted
- The curriculum is implemented as per the **teaching plan** prepared by the respective faculty which is based on the academic calendar provided by the University so as to complete the syllabus within the stipulated time
- Faculty members are sent to attend faculty orientation and refreshers courses, faculty development programmes, seminars, conferences, workshops, organized by University and other institutions
- All classrooms are equipped with modern teaching aids like LCD projector and audio systems. Computers and laptops with internet connection are accessible to all faculty members ensuring timely syllabus completion and quality enforcement
- Our learning resource centre the library is constantly upgraded with new books as well as new editions of the standard reference books in all subjects. Academic magazines and journals are also accessible to strengthen the teaching learning process
- **Training sessions** are conducted by the librarian for the teachers to get hands on experience of accessing the library e-resources through usage of **OPAC**. This in

- turn helps the teachers in providing the required reference materials of their respective subjects to the students for **effective learning**
- **SPSS workshops** are organised to enable the faculty and students to improve proficiency in research based teaching and learning
- Educational tours, field studio visits, court visits, BSE NSE workshops, etc. are conducted which make sure that graduation from here is not simply an exit from the campus but opens up new vistas.

- The institution provides the necessary infrastructure, qualified personnel, teaching aids, well equipped laboratories and other support services for smooth and effective implementation

- Academic calendar is prepared by the Academic Calendar Committee at the beginning of the term, which includes time schedule for effective completion of curriculum, schedule for conducting internal tests as well as other co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

- The College has an excellent collection of books in the library, which also has collaboration with British Council Library. The same can be used by the faculty to enhance their knowledge.
- The **Teaching plan** is drafted as per the syllabus and is subsequently implemented
- **Industrial visits** to research institutes and excursions are arranged by departments to extend theoretical knowledge to students, introduce career options and expose them to diverse job opportunities.
- Encouraging Learners for internships, post budget discussions, video lectures, library visits, newspapers and journals in classroom, implementing a p2p or peer buddy system are a glimpse of our impactful pedagogy
- Promotion of various modern techniques like flipped classrooms, e-delivery of notes, applications like coursera, academia and industry linkage activities viz. national and international commerce conferences are organised that enhance operationalization of curriculum
- Attendance of students is monitored at departmental levels and defaulters are reprimanded. Parent-teachers' meets are held to monitor progress of students.
- Regular **feedback** is taken from the students to identify the unstated aspects of curriculum delivery, and is further communicated to the respective teachers
- Departments conduct preliminary examinations to prepare students for university examinations. Remedial coaching and counselling is provided to weak and unsuccessful students.
- Extra coaching is given to meritorious students to excel in university examinations, which is evident from the fact that one of our student Mr. Pranay Ruparelia is the University topper of M.A in Film, Television and New Media.

- **Industrial visits** and educational excursions are arranged for extending theoretical and practical knowledge.

B) The Self Finance programme differs from other programmes in respect of the following points:

i. Admission Procedure:

- The University of Mumbai prescribes the rules and regulations for the admission to the academic programme and our institution, being an affiliated College follows the guidelines provided for both aided and self-financed courses
- The eligibility criteria for admission in self-finance courses are minimum 45% as against the minimum 35% in the B.Com course

- The intake capacity of self-finance courses is 60 seats as against the 120 seats of B.Com which makes it easier for the teachers to have one to one interaction with the learners
- B.Sc (I.T) course admits only learners who had opted for Mathematics at their FYJC and SYJC level whereas in B.Com there is no such requirement.

ii. Curriculum:

The College adopts the curriculum designed by the University of Mumbai.

- The self-finance programme have been following semester pattern of curriculum since inception whereas the B.Com programme follows semester pattern from the year 2011-12
- The Self-finance programmes provide a wide range of subjects in each semester for the learners whereas B.Com programmes provides subjects for each year which are divided into sections for the respective semester
- The curriculum of Self-Finance programme prescribes field visits, Industrial visits, Project Presentations and Assignments, which provides practical exposure to the students.

iii. Fee Structure: As Prescribed by the University of Mumbai

• The fees prescribed for Self-finance course is more as compared to B.Com as the courses are solely run by the management of the College.

iv. Teachers Qualification:

- Appointment of teachers for the courses is done as per the University norms. Post graduates with Ph.D. / M.Phil. / SET / NET qualification are given preference in the appointment. Teachers are selected by the duly constituted committee, which comprises of the Vice Chancellor Nominee, Management Representative, the Principal of the College and the head of the concerned department.
- Faculties having Industry experience are preferred in the self-finance courses so as to make the learners well equipped with the progressions in the contemporary industry environment.

v. Salary:

 Salary is given as per the UGC norms to the qualified teachers in aided and self-financed programmes. Other teachers are paid salary as per the norms set by the management of the College.

The University of Mumbai has no provision to combine the conventional face-to-face and Distance mode of education. However, the certificate and diploma courses offered by the College provide partial flexibility to students to choose the combination of conventional face-to-face and Distance Model of Education.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and institution's goals and objectives are integrated.

To supplement the University's curriculum and to ensure that the academic programmes, institution's goals and objectives are integrated, our institution undertakes various activities enlisted below:

Goal: To impart value based education with emphasis on self-discipline and character building

Our institution emphasizes on self-discipline for all, right from the peon to the Principal. It is mandatory for everyone to wear identity cards within the campus. Our campus is mobile free. We ensure that the students fulfill 75% attendance as per the University norms. In order to inculcate moral values and mould the students our Social Impact Committee, NSS, NCC and DLLE contributes largely through their extension activities.

Goal: To promote healthy student teacher relationship:

Class teachers play an important role in promoting healthy student-teacher relationship. As mentors, they approach the students on one-to-one basis and help them to resolve their personal, academic and social issues if any. We ensure accountability of the teachers for being non-partisan towards students.

Goal: To improve quality of teaching through evaluation of teachers by students:

A well-structured feedback system is developed whereby the teachers are evaluated by the students annually and the analysis is communicated to the concerned teacher.

Goal: To reduce students' dependence on coaching classes:

Teachers conduct lectures regularly and ensure completion of syllabus on time. Advanced learners and slow learners are provided the much needed guidance. Remedial lectures are conducted for slow learners periodically and the advanced learners are encouraged to excel.

Goal: To enrich the students' personality by encouraging their participation in curricular and extracurricular activities

We believe in holistic development of the students. Eleven intercollegiate festivals are organized, apart from academics, cultural and sports to hone their leadership, event management, marketing and finance management skills.

Goal: To make the College a model institution of excellence in all respects

Focusing on Academic excellence, following measures are implemented:

- High standards of discipline
- Smart enforcement of attendance norms
- ICT enabled teaching
- Enriched learning resource centre
- Conducive and congenial working environment to staff (Teaching & non-teaching) and students
- Open and transparent system of administration without fear or favour
- In order to implement the above efforts the institution makes available all conducive infrastructure, library services, general expertise from external resource persons, support services like NSS, NCC, YRC, various cultural activities, and so on

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to modify and organize the curriculum to enhance the experience of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Our College initiates various activities, which are as follows:

1) Guest lectures

Guest lectures are organized by various departments and associations to impart value based knowledge to students beyond the syllabus.

2) Employability Test

Mock tests, Group discussions, personal interviews are conducted by Career Guidance Cell to prepare the students for various competitive and entrance exams. Case study, project presentations and assignments are given as a part of curriculum activities to the students to make them employable.

3) Development of quantitative ability

Vedic Maths is introduced to the students, which enables them to do mathematical calculation within a short time.

4) Industrial visits

Industrial visits are organised to provide learners functional opportunity in different sectors like I T, Manufacturing and Services, Finance and Marketing.

5) Development of Leadership skills

Leadership skills are developed through NSS, NCC, DLLE and WDC activities whereby the students learn human relations, decision making skills and self-confidence. NSS and NCC organises camps wherein the leadership skills are sharpened.

6) Life Skill

A certificate course in life skills is introduced which is built around crafting opportunities for students to acquire skills and to develop personality. NSS, NCC, WDC, Rotaract Club, DLLE conduct various activities resulting into Life Skill development among students. Informative and motivational videos, documentaries depicting social and economic issues are screened to create awareness among the students.

7) Entrepreneurial Skill

In order to impart entrepreneurial skill among students 'Commerce Association' organizes 'Maha Anna Purna Utsav' whereby their entrepreneurial skills are honed. Entrepreneurial Development Cell also organises various activities to bring out the entrepreneurial ability of the students.

8) **Soft skills**

Soft skills are personal attributes that enhances the students interaction, job performance and career prospects. Through soft skill programmes student's ability to interact effectively is enhanced which is broadly applicable both in and outside the workplace. It enhances abilities and capabilities of the students.

9) Language lab

Language lab of our institution involves learners to actively participate in language learning exercises and get more practice than otherwise possible in traditional classroom environment. Interactive sessions are conducted with professionals, technical experts, academicians to enhance the learning experience of students.

10) **KSkool**

Kskool provides placement and job opportunities for the students. Apart from academics, students take advantage of enthralling sessions, which are building blocks for entrepreneur as well as entrepreneurship. The curriculum of Kskool is designed as under:

Regular feedback on the process is sought from the learners and the teachers. The IQAC analyses it and organises required help or measures.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental education, Human rights, ICT etc into the curriculum.

In consonance with the vision statement, our institution lays great emphasis on preparing the students to contribute to a rapidly changing world. In order to sensitize the learners towards various social and community issues the institution initiates the following measures:

1) Gender Sensitization

We provide equal opportunities to all irrespective of the gender. The Women Development and Empowerment Cell (WDEC) creates awareness among the students through screening movies like Mandi, Manthan, Umbharta, Ankur, Dor etc. Documentaries and plays on various issues comprehending gender discrimination, domestic violence, child labour, sexual exploitation and women empowerment are screened. Along with a NGO 'Majilis' WDEC indoctrinates the students on women related rules and regulations. It also organizes Self Defence Training programme for the female students.

2) Climate change and Environmental Education

The 21st century is witnessing increasing environmental imbalances and serious environmental problems. To educate the students about these issues, Nature club of the College disseminates knowledge about environment and its allied issues. Knowledge related to Electronic waste, reduction of carbon footprint, conservation of natural resources and the use of solar energy, saving birds life, recycling process, save water, vermicomposting, thermosetting ACs, monitoring of taps and classrooms to avoid power and water wastage, etc. is given to students. Solar panels have been installed; 'Tree Plantation' and 'River March' have been initiated by the Nature Club, NSS and NCC of our institution. The institution has initiated the beautification of platform no.1 of the Kandivli Station as a step towards the community service. Nature club has also initiated a certificate course in environment education.

3) Human Rights

As part of our Foundation Course curriculum human rights subject is taught in each class and legal experts are invited to address the students and make them aware of their rights as an individual. On one hand, the authority of state is required to maintain order and stability in the state and on the other it is essential to have rights for the individual, and therefore, it is necessary to promote and protect human rights. The Equal Opportunities Centre and Social Impact committee of our College have taken steps towards the same. **Gratitude Day** is organized wherein students and staff voluntarily contribute in cash from which needful items are purchased and distributed to our College class IV employees (peons, housekeeping and watchmen). **Caring for the Deprived** drive is undertaken to help the deprived and under privileged people of our society.

4) ICT

Class rooms are ICT enabled, exclusive seminar hall with state-of-the-art technology and computerized central library, laptops, IMAC desktop laboratory, projectors, electronic display boards, OMR system of recording attendance, information KIOSK, kindle lab, internet facility, knowledge dissemination board, TV access, firewall, license software, air pc all are provided, DSLR cameras for media students, sound mixers and audio speakers, microphones, public address system are the significant facilities available on the campus to the students and the faculty.

1.3.4 What are the various value added courses / enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students.

- i) Moral and ethical values

Apart from academic improvement among students, holistic development is equally important for all students and for that purpose our institution initiates various activities on 1) Moral and Ethical values, 2) Employable and Life skills, 3) Better career options, and 4) Community orientation.

1) Moral and Ethical Values

In order to instill moral and ethical values in the students, our institution initiates various programmes and activities, which are enlisted below:

- Social Impact Committee celebrates Joy of giving fortnight every year wherein teachers and students contribute and the proceeds in kind are given to the orphanages. To make the students realise the concept of dignity of labour 'Gratitude Day' is celebrated, where the students felicitate the Class IV employees as recognition for their services and express their gratitude by making them feel special
- This year the students bounty knew no limits when they distributed food, clothing and utensils to the victims of the fire at Damu Nagar, Kandivli
- As a part of Project 'Samanvay', Our students endeavour to bring happiness and cheer in the life's of senior citizens who are members of Dada Dadi Mandal and a programme is organised for them on every third Sunday of each month
- NSS Camps are organised every year and various cleanliness drives are undertaken by the students in consensus with the Swach Bharat Abhiyaan

2) Employable and Life Skills

The Institution has set its mission of making the students job ready and to ensure this, various activities and programmes are undertaken:

- Career Guidance Cell is formed to provide the students with the necessary counselling required for job prospects and prepare them for the same. Career Fair organised to bring the industries in academia and provide internships and placements
- **Kskool- the finishing school** runs a training programme to mould the personality of the students and make them confident. It is the ideal platform for the students as it helps in enhancing their skills. The skill development programme is structured as follows:

- i) **Diploma in Taxation** It is conducted to bridge the gap between the critical and practical knowledge of Direct and Indirect tax.
- ii) **Diploma in Banking and Finance** It is introduced in order to impart knowledge and skills related to banking industry and it also provides employment opportunities to students.
- iii) Certificate course in Retail marketing It is introduced to ensure that our learners must be able to cope up with the present job market environment.
- iv) **Certificate course in Travel and Tourism** It provides them a practical exposure of the functioning of the Travel and Tourism industry.
- v) **National Skill Development Course-** It is conducted in association with **Bombay Stock Exchange** to provide the necessary skill development to the learner to make them market savvy.
- vi) **Tally programme** is conducted for students in order to be more employable.
- vii) **Employability aptitude tests** are conducted in order to make sure that the students ambitions and desires match their potentiality.

4) Community orientation

- The institution has initiated the beautification of platform no.1 of the Kandivli Station as a step towards community service
- NSS unit of the College has been instrumental in sensitizing learners towards the community and its allied issues and have been involved in upliftment of human race through its activities such as organising blood donation camps, stemcell donation camps, visiting slums and villages to create awareness about cleanliness as their contribution towards Swachh Bharat mission project
- As part of the cleanliness drive, the Revoluters group in association with our College organised a river march for encouraging cleaning of the five rivers in Mumbai
- DLLE, NSS, Social Impact Committee, create awareness among students that brings out changes in social attitudes and community practices
- DLLE, NSS, Social Impact Committee creates humanitarian approach which has given way to practical utilization approach which views investment in welfare through social frame work policy resulting into upliftment of society and community
- Rotaract club of the College organised Paper for a cause project wherein old newspapers were collected and sold and the funds were donated to the needy people
- Our College has a tie up with Dada Dadi Mandal called 'Samanvay' which undertakes various activities for the senior citizens

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

- Our teachers participate in subject related workshops organised by the Board of studies, University of Mumbai where they share their feedback.
- Structured Feedback is taken from the students on the effectiveness of the curriculum prescribed.
- Suggestions on the curriculum are encouraged from the academic peers from the neighbouring colleges
- Workshops and seminars organised by the Institution bring in faculty from other institutions and experts. The feedback provided by them is passed on to Board of Studies to act upon.
- Introduction of value added courses and other enrichment programs are the direct outcome of the need felt by students and the Institution. The curriculum of such courses is updated on regular basis based on the feedback received from students, placement agencies and industry.

The quality of the enrichment of programs is evaluated mainly by judging whether the stated objectives are met. The feedback from different stakeholders provides an objective assessment of the programs. The enrolment of students, placement records serve as evaluation measures.

- Mr. Vaibhav Ashar, one of our faculty contributed towards revision in syllabus of B.Com (Fin. Mkts) through correspondence with the Board of studies and his suggestion as were incorporated.
- We have also organized workshop for orientation of restructured syllabus for Bachelors of Management studies and Bachelors of Mass Media

CRITERION II: 2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The College follows an **open and transparent approach** throughout the entire admission process ensuring transparency at each level. It follows the guidelines set by the University of Mumbai. The **university circular** in this regard is displayed on the **College Notice Board, Standees** and the College **website**. The **schedule** of the admission is also stated in the **notice** put up by the College. **Information pamphlets for the same** are given in the **leading dailies and also distributed** in our normal catchment areas regarding the commencement of the admissions soon after the XII standard results are declared. The same is put up on the **Electronic Notice Board, which** is installed conspicuously, at the College entrance with the cutoff percentage, which is visible from the road. The **prospectus** is made available on College website, which is exhaustive in content. The **merit list is put up on the notice board and the website,** strictly according to the **category** to which the student belongs. **Knowledge Dissemination Board** also displays the merit list for students' reference. **SMSes** are sent to the eligible students and their parents to complete the admission process.

The College has set up an **Admission committee**, comprising of the teaching staff, non-teaching staff and student members for smooth operation of the admission process, who are readily available at the **help desk** to provide guidance needed by the candidate.

The College has adopted 'Brick to Click' approach to ease out the admission process. The entire admission process is online (www.kessconline.com) starting from filling of admission forms to payment of fee through payment gateway thereby giving open access to all the prospective learners who are willing to take admission.

- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission. [Ex. (i) merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test and interview, (iv) common tests conducted by state agencies and national agencies, (v) others followed by the College].
- Criteria Adopted

- ➤ For UG programme, admission is strictly on merit basis. After the higher secondary results are declared, the College announces the opening of online admission process under the guidelines of University of Mumbai. Helpdesk is set up to guide and counsel the students.
- ➤ For PG programme, admissions are done offline and the process is the same as UG programme except for the programme M.A. in Business Economics and M.A in Film, Television and New Media Production where admissions are done through an entrance test.
- ➤ For Ph.D degree, admissions are based on PET/NET/SET eligibility of the applicant. Vacancies are advertised in reputed newspapers and on the College website and the applicant is selected on the basis of recommendations and decisions of the interview panel.

Admission process

- Admission committee in consultation with the Principal and as per the directives of University of Mumbai chalks out the entire admission process
- ➤ The candidates are required to fill up the University pre-enrolment form available on the university website, www.mum.net.in
- Registration and filling of the admission form is done on the online College admission portal -

www.kessconline.com/Degreeregistration/Registrationlogin.aspx

- ➤ The candidates are then required to submit the admission form along with the application fees through the online payment portal
- ➤ Category wise merit list is declared by the College through Electronic Display Boards, Knowledge Dissemination Boards, Notice Boards, College Website and SMSes are sent to students & their parents
- > They are required to pay fees online only
- Necessary documents like mark sheets, leaving certificates, etc are verified
- ➤ Admission committee confirms the admission and issues an acknowledgement slip
- The same process is continued for the next merit list till all the seats are filled
- ➤ The students have an option to withdraw admission within the stipulated time period as decided by the University rules

Minimum and Maximum percentage of marks of our College:

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The **IQAC** reviews and studies the admission process and profiles of the students every year to ensure transparency.

The **Admission Committee** consisting of members of teaching, non- teaching staff and students is formed according to the **University guidelines** to monitor the entire admission process in the College. As the College is a Gujarati minority, 50% of the seats are reserved for minority students. Students from socially backward groups, as well as economically weaker sections, students with learning disabilities, children of widows, defense personnel and Kashmir migrants are given reservations as per university norms. Deserving students are given admission under Sports and Cultural quota. In case of any grievance, the admission committee looks into it and resolves. This helps us in reviewing our intake quality and quantity.

- 2.1.5 What are the strategies adopted to increase /improve access to students belonging to the following categories.

- SC/ST/ OBC candidates are provided with benefits including scholarship as per the government and the University rules. Equal Opportunity Cell is set up to guide & help such students to avail all benefits available to them under various government schemes
- Women students are ensured a very safe, secure and conducive environment. The Women Development and Empowerment Cell have been formed to look into their concerns. CCTV cameras are also installed all over the campus
- Differently abled candidates are provided with infrastructural support like hand railings, elevators, wheelchair, ramps and special toilets. Full fees exemption is given to such students. Grace marks, extra time and writers are also provided during examinations as per the University norms
- Needy and deserving candidates belonging to the economically weaker sections are given financial support through freeship under the Vidyotejak scheme instituted by the College management and Educare by the staff. Book bank facility is provided to the underprivileged and meritorious students
- Achievers in sports and extracurricular activities are encouraged by providing financial and infrastructural support
 - > Sports kit is given to all the students participating in intercollegiate sports activities
 - > Professional coaches for each sport played are appointed to train the students
 - > Special diet is provided to sports and NCC students
 - Tracksuits are given to all the NCC cadets
 - ➤ Participation fees, conveyance, refreshment expense and costumes are provided to all intra and intercollegiate participants at District, State, National and International level
 - ➤ Choreographers and directors are appointed to sharpen the skills of students participating in inter collegiate cultural and cine dramatic events
 - NSS students are given financial support to organise their activities
 - ➤ **Grace attendance** is given to the participants of curricular and extracurricular activities
 - Academic support is given by teachers in improving their academic performance
 - > State- of-the- art infrastructural facilities are provided to carry out various activities
 - A playground of 40,000 sq. ft, a luxury for a College in a city like Mumbai
 - ➤ Air conditioned Library
 - ➤ Well equipped Gymkhana

➤ Separate well equipped rooms are provided for activities like NCC, NSS, Cultural, Women Development and Empowerment Cell, Department of Life Long learning Extension & Equal Opportunity Center

Students are continuously motivated to participate in prominent National and International events and festivals like Kala Ghoda festival, Malhar and Umang. A non-prejudicial and a non- discriminatory process are followed in selection and support for all activities.

All the courses have seen an increase in the number of applications, indicating favourable response and trend for enrolling in this College. This increase is reflected due to dedicated and committed teaching faculty, excellent infrastructure and other facilities. It is also due to the student-friendly initiatives implemented by the College.

There is a growing demand for self-finance programmes such as Bachelor of Management Studies, Bachelor of Commerce (Accounting & Finance), Bachelor of Mass Media, so additional divisions have been started. Programmes such as Bachelor of Commerce (Investment Management), Bachelor of Commerce/BMS in Environmental Management and Economics and Bachelor of Arts in Film, Television and New Media Production are recently introduced programmes. Efforts are being taken by the College to establish these programmes.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The College has initiated the following steps

- Exemption in fees: Total fee exemption is given to physically challenged and specially-abled students
- Infrastructure: The College campus is easily accessible. Special infrastructure facilities like ramps, lifts, hand railing, toilet for differently abled is made available. A special desk/bench is made available to a student with muscular dystrophy. The library reserves a special seat named 'Divyang' at the entrance, for easy accessibility
- Helpful Human Resource: It is very satisfying and gratifying to note that right from the security staff and from peon to Principal, all lend a helping hand to such students. Special timetable is prepared and classrooms are shuffled for the convenience of such students, whenever required. Fellow students take special care of differently abled students
- Concession in Attendance: The College honours the government norms in this regard and provide concession in attendance as per the norms stipulated by University of Mumbai
- **Examination:** During the examinations, special attention and utmost care is taken towards relaxing the rules for such students. Writers are provided on demand and grace marks are given to Learning Disabled (LD) students.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students need in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the program? If 'yes', give detail on the process.

The College strives to enhance the academic talent of the students by providing proper guidance to them before the commencement of the programme. During the admission process, helpdesks are available and the members of the admission committee counsel the aspiring students to seek admission by recommending the most appropriate course, keeping in mind the capability of the student and the learning objective of the programme. They are also informed about the demand and the career opportunities of the course for the ease of selection. However, there is no structured provision for assessment of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the program. At the beginning of the year, induction / orientation program is conducted to inform students about various activities of associations and add-on courses available to hone their knowledge and skills. The College also arranges career fair. The College follows peer buddy / Peer-to-Peer concept for collaborative learning.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/ Remedial/ Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the program of their choice?

The College follows **cafeteria approach** i.e. offering varied add-on courses apart from the traditional ones and the following strategies are adopted to enable them to cope with the requirements of the programme.

- **Bridge course**: Bridge courses are conducted for weak students to fill their knowledge gap.
- Remedial lectures: During the course of the program, teachers identify slow learners and conduct remedial lectures to improve their academic performance. The College enables peer buddy system by having informal bonding between the slow and the advanced learners.
- Add-On courses: College has introduced 12 diploma and certificate courses in different areas like Diploma in Direct Indirect Taxation, Banking & Finance, Retail Marketing, Travel & Tourism, Fashion Designing, Jewellery Designing, Interior Designing and Certificate course on Corporate Social Responsibility keeping in line with the cafeteria approach
- The College has **collaborated** with the following professional institutes keeping in mind the requirements of students in today's globalised world
 - ➤ ACCA- Association of Chartered Certified Accountants
 - > FINPLAN- International Institute of Management
 - > CFP- Ambition Learning Solutions
 - ➤ ADA- Academy of Digital Arts
 - > IIBF- Indian Institute of Banking and Finance
 - > CSR Company India Private Ltd
 - > Endeavour- For preparation for competitive exams

The College is running MHRD initiated Hindustani Pracharni Sabha's **Saral Hindi course** to develop Hindi speaking and writing skills, as the College is a Gujarati Linguistic Minority. A Language laboratory is installed for enhancing English language and vocabulary of the students. They are also made aware of the online courses like **Coursera**, **MOOCs**, **E-Gyan**, **Khan Academy**, **Technology Entertainment Designs** (**TED**) **talks** during the course of the lecture by the teachers.

- Enrichment Program: Every year the College organises conferences, seminars, workshops and guest lectures, by inviting eminent personalities to enhance the knowledge of the students. Various departments conduct workshops and competitions regularly. Career guidance cell conducts talks and seminar focusing on career prospects. The library conducts Book review competition. The research cell organises research based seminar exclusively for the students at national level by giving a platform to the students to undertake research
- **Kskool: Kskool, a finishing school** for educates is formed to develop their soft skills, so that they are able to crack the interviews for placements. A consultant with an annual salary of Rs 12,00,000/- is appointed to mentor the students for training and placements
- 2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- Women Development and Empowerment Cell(WDEC) is constituted which conducts programmes and activities related to gender equality, gender bias and eve teasing by staging street plays, showing documentary films, putting up posters & hoardings and conducting lectures
- Social Impact Committee (SIC) is formed to sensitise the students towards societal needs. SIC celebrates 'Joy of Giving – fortnight' every year where the students and the staff contribute cash and kind, which is then given to an orphanage and tribal girls hostel. Gratitude day is celebrated to express gratitude towards the support staff. Very recently, it had undertaken the noble task of helping the victims of cylinder blast at Damu Nagar slums, Kandivli (East). They also visit the old age homes and orphanages. Under 'Caring for Deprived' activity, SIC collects old clothes from students and distributes amongst street dwellers. Keeping in line with the national objective of Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan the College lent a helping hand by spending Rs. 5,93,000/- on beautification of Kandivli railway station platform no. 1 and it is maintained on a regular basis. The role of **NSS** is very crucial. It undertakes 2 to 3 **blood donation** camps encouraging students and faculties to donate blood. A platelet donation Apart from this, they also conduct AIDS awareness camp is in the offing. programme, Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan Programme and promote such activities through street plays at public places. Equal Opportunity Centre disseminates knowledge about the different schemes, facilities and financial support made available by the Ministry of Social Welfare, Govt. of Maharashtra to the economically and socially backward students. This helps in positive discrimination. They also provide guidance for competitive exams like UPSC and MPSC.
- Nature club plays a leading role in exploring and sensitizing students on environmental consciousness. It organises various activities like nature trails, tree plantation drives. Students organised and took part in 'river march' organized by the Municipal Corporation and NGO 'Revolunteers' formed by our students, enlightening people on conserving the rivers, which have become *Nullas*. The College is a member of **Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS)** and students take active part in their activities. **Green audit** is conducted for environment consciousness. Rainwater harvesting, solid waste management is vogue for the last 7 years. During the kite-flying season, the students are exposed to the danger of killing birds and practical lectures on 'Save birds' were conducted by an NGO, to sensitize students. The Nature club, NSS unit and NCC unit of the College play a key role in making the campus clean and green. NSS unit undertakes the activities of cleaning and maintaining a small village on the outskirts of Bordi, district Thane.

The College sensitizes the staff and the students by taking **additional** measures.

- Induction/ Orientation programmes: The College conducts Induction/Orientation programmes for teachers and students respectively at the beginning of the year, wherein the principal in her address encourages the staff and the students to participate in the activities of the associations such as NCC, NSS, Women Development Empowerment Cell, Social Impact Committee, Nature Club, etc.
- **Knowledge Dissemination Board**: On every floor, Knowledge Dissemination Board (KDB) is put up which gives up-to-date knowledge about the current

affairs, environment, society, human rights, gender-related issues through clips and motion pictures

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The faculty identifies the advanced learners through past performance in examination and classroom interaction and reaction. Once the students are identified, following actions are taken to respond to their learning needs.

- They are recommended to use reference books and journals to enhance their knowledge and improve their academic ability
- Encouraged to participate in intra and intercollegiate curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities
- Students are guided & encouraged to write and present research papers at the National level Student Research Conference organised by the College and other colleges
- Motivating such students to take part in 'Avishkar', a State level research contest representing the University
- They are sent to participate in Workshops, Seminars and Corporate level conferences to expose them to contemporary, economic and financial issues
- Career guidance cell organises talks and workshops for career advancement of students
- Teachers set question paper in such a manner that 1/3rd of the questions comprises of higher order thinking skills
- Gold card scheme is introduced in the library
- Recognition and felicitation is given to the meritorious students
- Educate them about Khan Academy/ online references

2.2.6 How does the institution collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the program duration) of the students at risk of drop out (Students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The College has identified various reasons for dropouts and to counter the same, various strategies have been worked out to minimize the impact. Following are the reasons and our counter strategies.

- Attendance defaulters: This is one of the most authentic indications of potential dropout. The Attendance committee collects the data from the administrative staff. Attendance defaulters list is displayed on the notice board at the end of every month. A parent meeting is conducted and they are informed about their wards poor attendance. The class teacher mentors such vulnerable students to cope with their attendance and academic performance. This strategy has worked substantially as the defaulters list gradually declines from the beginning of the term to the end of the term.
- External exam: External exams are conducted per semester according to University norms. The question paper is set with a mindset to cater to the capability of the diverse class of students. Despite this, there are some students, who are not able to score minimum marks. They are declared as ATKT (Allowed To Keep Terms). Such students are identified by the respective subject teachers

and **special coaching and counselling** is done. **Remedial lectures** are conducted for such students before they appear for the ATKT exams

- Slow learners, Introvert, Shy students: Student possessing such qualities may sometimes take decision to discontinue their studies. To encourage such introvert / shy students and slow learners, the College conducts English Speaking Course. Besides, various competitions are conducted and students are encouraged to take part in such competitions which enable them to uplift their morale and boost their confidence
- Financial Constraints: Financial problem is one of the causes of dropout. Notice about government scholarships for students (economically weak) is circulated from time to time intimating such students to avail the benefits. In order to enable them to continue their studies, the College gives installment facility, scholarship schemes like Vidyotejak and Educare
- Medical Constraints: Special infrastructure facility like ramps, lifts, railing and parking facility is provided to make them feel comfortable and prevent dropouts.

2.3 TEACHING LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)

At the beginning of the year, academic calendar committee prepares **academic calendar** based on the schedule of University of Mumbai. It gives an outline of prominent curricular and extra-curricular activities to be conducted, internal as well as external examination schedule, dates of winter, summer and Diwali vacations. Academic calendar is displayed on the staff and student's notice board and also on the College website. It helps the teaching staff, non-teaching staff and students to plan their academic and administrative schedule well in advance.

Head of the departments, in consultation with members, assign the subjects based on their specialization and preferences and also decide the timeline to cover the syllabus. As per the guidelines given by the head of the department and the academic calendar, the teachers prepare comprehensive **teaching plan**, which makes teaching-learning process more effective.

Timetable committee coordinates with the teacher in-charge of each department and prepares with respect to class **timetable** well in advance and displays it on the College website and notice board.

Examination committee at the beginning of the academic year decides the examination schedule including the dates of internal and external examinations. The committee orients the teachers and students about the rules and regulations, examination circulars, evaluation and moderation procedures, unfair means punishments and rules relating to grace marks. All these help in smooth conduct of examination and evaluation.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC through its discussion and deliberation in its three-tier committee meetings, reviews, recommends and suggest measures to improve teaching-learning process. Following are the initiatives implemented.

- It ensures that the teachers are recruited on time and the workload is allocated as per University norms
- It motivates teachers to adopt innovative teaching and learning methods
- It ensures that the teaching plan and log book is submitted and maintained and also ensures timely completion of syllabus
- It ensures that the College completes at least 180 days of teaching
- It scrutinizes the question paper to ensure that it is set in a manner keeping in mind the slow and the advanced learners
- It analyses the results and suggests means to improve the teaching and learning process
- It encourages teachers to participate in workshops, conferences, seminars to hone their skills
- It motivates the teachers to attend orientation, refresher and other short-term faculty development programs
- Teachers and students are motivated to take up research activities
- Academic and administrative audits are conducted
- It recommends the new programmes /add-on courses to be introduced with the changing times of needs
- It recommends the need for infrastructural developments as per the requirements

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Our College follows Cafeteria approach to enable the students to have a multi-skill set. To make learning more student-centric, following teaching - learning methods are used through classroom information highway:-

- Interactive learning skill: Practical sessions are conducted by the teachers for one to one interaction with the students. Quiz, powerpoint presentations, role play, playing audios, group discussions, debate competitions, screening videos, working on case study, exhibitions and guest lectures are the methods used for the same.
- Collaborative learning skill: Team participation in projects, poster and models, workshops, surveys, PLN- Personal Learning Network and management games, lectures on group dynamics and Peer to Peer are conducted. Industrial and educational visits are also organized from time to time.
- **Independent learning skill:** Student's research seminar, field survey, essay competitions, case studies, home assignments, conferences, internships, blogs, and paper review methods are followed to enhance the independent learning skills in the teaching learning process.

Support Structure and System

College provides the following support structure and system to make teaching-learning process more effective.

- Classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors
- Computer with internet facility
- Well equipped library with latest books, journals, e resources, audio-video resources and database
- Kindle Lab in the library
- State-of-the-art laboratories
- Laptops for staff

- Air-conditioned auditorium
- Conference and Seminar rooms
- Adoption of innovative methods like Flipped classroom, peer buddy
- College website & personal blogs
- Exposure to online database, Technology Entertainment Designs (TED) talks, Khan Academy, online references
- Student and faculty exchange program
- Different Associations and Committees are formed to undertake curricular, extracurricular and extension activities for holistic development of students

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life- long learners and innovators?

The College encourages students to be lifelong learners and innovators through the combined experience gained during participation in academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities organized for them. The activities (group and individual) help students nurture their management skills, marketing skills, leadership qualities and entrepreneurship abilities.

- Critical thinking: Debate competitions, Essay competitions, Elocution, Role play, Paper Review, Group Discussions, Project Work and Assignments, Book review competition activate critical thinking. Industrial visits and Management of activities of various associations and committees by appointing student secretary's and joint secretary's help the students to deal with practical situations. Topics of discussion and debates are given beforehand in the class to the students and they are asked to refer and think on it, thereby motivating and encouraging them to participate in debate and group discussions.
- Creativity: Rangoli competition, flower decoration, poster competitions, singing competitions, model preparations, mehendi and salad dressing competitions, best out of waste competitions give an opportunity to students to express their creativity in a constructive way. Cultural association, Cine and dramatic society, Youth Forum, Women Development and Empowerment Cell, Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension give opportunities to students for showcasing their creative skills. Students are also given a platform to express their writing skills in College magazine Kandivlite and newsletters published by various associations. Theme-based programmes and relevant decor reflect student's creativity.
- Scientific temperament: Participation in poster competitions, project and model building competitions, guest lectures by experts, problem-based learning activities develop scientific temperament amongst students. National level student research conference gives a platform to the students to have an edge over other students. Students are also motivated to participate and present research papers in the conferences and seminar organized by other institutions in India and abroad.

- Study tours and industrial visits are arranged every year to provide them with an experience of current practices.
- Every year College organizes student's research seminar where they participate and present their research papers.
- Teachers are encouraged to undertake minor research project at university, UGC and College level. Our management gives seed money for the same to teachers of Self finance courses.

- Newspapers such as Education /Economic Times in classrooms improve their general knowledge and vocabulary and create awareness of current affairs
- KDB increases memory imprint and enhances retention capabilities
- Internship based learning gives hands-on experience, expertise learning, practical learning and exposes to real-life learning situation
- Create awareness about the new development in their subjects
- Prepares them for further career development
- Provision of kindle lab enhances their ability and passion for reading

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Our Learning Resource Center (LRC) is well equipped with 37,379 books, 35 journals, 2 International journals, 31 magazines, e-journals, educational CDs, e-database such as Indiastats, Taxman. It is a member of educational consortia like Inflibnet, N-list etc. It provides facilities of reading room to the students and staff, UGC network resource center for students, OPAC and co-operative human resource. Air-conditioned library makes learning atmosphere more conducive.

Reference books are procured on demand for faculty and students also issue books to update their knowledge in their respective fields of specializations.

- College website has a separate library portal to make use of various e-learning tools and techniques with the help of teachers who are trained in the concerned area of e-learning
- LRC has a collection of College magazines, prospectus and annual reports
- Syllabus sets and question paper sets of past examinations are available online and offline for easy access and reference

- Book exhibitions are regularly organised to make staff and students aware of the new publications available.
- Special section for newly procured books is stationed at the library entrance
- Theme based exhibition of books is organised on special commemorative days e.g. on Gandhi Jayanti books on Gandhiji, Books are also exhibited on Tagore memorial day, Vivekananda's birth anniversary and on other such events
- Separate research section with computers along with internet facility and printer is available for faculty to undertake research activities
- It organises book review competition to encourage students to develop their reading habits
- Books and CDs on competitive exams are also available
- Daily newspapers including regional languages are put up on the shelf to update oneself with current affairs
- **Best reader award** is given by the library to motivate teachers to regularly visit library and enhance their reading skills
- Newspaper reading stands are installed

All these efforts invested by the library make teaching-learning process more effective and vibrant.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these

Yes, the College faces the challenge of completing syllabus due to either varied number of days in a term or due to delay in the admission process or leaves taken by some teachers. To cope with it, following measures are undertaken.

- Teaching from the very second day of the academic term to avoid loss of teaching days
- Sharing of or conducting extra lectures, whenever necessary
- Resettling of lecture timetable at the end of the term
- Sitting beyond working hours
- Reducing the number of paper assessment days
- No activities are conducted during the lectures
- In case, a teacher is on maternity, medical or study leave, substitute teacher is appointed or extra lectures are taken

The College has taken the following initiatives to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning to ensure achievement of learning objectives.

- Role of IQAC is inevitable in monitoring teaching-learning process. Analysis of student feedback and result is done by IQAC and accordingly recommendations are given to improvise, if necessary, in its regular meetings
- Principal in her regular meetings with staff, class representatives and students, reviews and monitors teaching-learning process. Through brainstorming discussions and deliberations with faculty, efforts are taken to ensure quality of teaching-learning
- **Head of Departments and Course co-ordinators**, informally take feedback from faculty and students. In regular meetings, issues like completion of syllabus,

question paper setting, results, uniformity in internal assessment, matter related to subject is discussed and reviewed

- Class teachers in classroom interactions take feedback from students and use innovative teaching methods to make learning more student-centric
- **Alumni** and **Parents** in their visit to campus interact with Principal and teachers and give their valuable suggestions and recommendations
- Suggestion boxes are kept at strategic points to encourage students and other stakeholders to give their opinion
- **Happiness Index** is developed taking feedback from all stakeholders to gauge their level of satisfaction

All these initiatives have brought credits to our institution over a period of time.

2.4 TEACHER QUALITY

The College has adopted various strategies to recruit and retain qualified and competent human resource

Recruitment

Recruitment of the teachers is done strictly on the basis of the norms laid down by the UGC. The vacant posts are advertised in the newspapers having all India circulation specifying the qualifications prescribed by the University. Selections are purely on merit. Appointment of faculty whether permanent, temporary, visiting or guest is done as per the University guidelines. Experienced professionals from the industry are invited as visiting faculty to give industry exposure to the students. Deserving faculty in Aided and Un-Aided sections are paid as per the 6th pay commission norms.

Retention

Timely increments in the remuneration are made on the basis of performance. Chief co-ordinators and course co-ordinators are given consolidated additional remuneration for their extra efforts. The teachers and the students are sent to participate in workshops/seminars/conferences. They are also encouraged to undertake research activities. Teachers are motivated to enhance their academic qualification and are felicitated on the Annual day. Mediclaim facility is also provided to retain self-finance teachers. The College strongly believes in the inclusive growth of both, students as well as teachers.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new Programs/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Institutional Efforts taken:

The College is situated in the financial capital of the country, so normally we do not face problems regarding the growing demand for qualified senior faculty, but in niche courses

- Qualified and experienced visiting faculty is appointed with the best remuneration to give additional knowledge to the students as per the current market requirements
- People from industry and higher institutes of learning are called to teach new programmes
- We have people from the industry as faculty such as Rajesh Gupta who is regular face on TV for SBI cap, a cinematographer who has worked with Ramanand Sagar as faculty, F.R. Khan, Serial Director
- The College motivates the existing teachers to attend seminars, workshops, national and international conferences
- Workshops on syllabus restructuring help the teachers to understand and update themselves with the recent trends in their respective fields

- The teachers are encouraged to undertake Ph.D, publish research papers and apply for research projects
- Faculties are also motivated to undertake training programs like Coursera, MOOCS, SPSS, Research Methodology, Data Analysis, etc
- Teachers are sent to other institutions under flipped classroom and train-thetrainer program
- Wherever required, inter-department faculty exchange is practiced.
- A well-equipped library is available to provide additional support to the faculty and the students.

Outcome:

- Student enrolment in new courses has increased
- Goodwill of the College in terms of teaching-learning has improved and it has also attracted qualified faculty to fill up the vacancies
- The College has initiated the start of new courses introduced by University of Mumbai and has appointed qualified and experienced faculty which has resulted in qualitative teaching and better placements of our students

- College conducts workshops and training programmes for the teaching staff
- To facilitate research-based learning the SPSS and Anti-plagiarism software is installed
- Teachers are felicitated on their enhancement in qualification and achievements in the field of research
- Conducting *paper clinic* to improvise the quality of research
- Some teachers are recognized as M.Phil/Ph.D guides and also as external examiners
- The College has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Gujarat Commerce College for student and faculty exchange program

- Yes, the College has introduced evaluation of **teachers by the students**
 - A **feedback** form from the students is obtained with respect to teacher and course. These forms are analysed and evaluated reports are perused by the Principal. The outcome of the evaluation is intimated to the individual teacher for better understanding of his strength and weaknesses for further improvement.
 - ➤ Head of the department also takes informal feedback from the students.

➤ **Happiness Index** is developed which gives an insight into the satisfaction levels of the stakeholders.

Teachers are also evaluated by External experts such as

- External moderators are invited to review the question papers, moderate the answer sheets and give their feedback.

Evaluation goes a long way in improving the quality of the teaching-learning process.

We have different sets of communication channels. The evaluation process is disseminated via:

- Posts on Band group

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- The University has switched to Choice Based Credit and Grading System since the academic year 2011-12, which is accepted and followed by the College for preparing first and second year results
- University has started with the transfer of credit system which is also adopted by the College
- As per university rules, moderation of answer sheet, revaluation & verification of marks is done for the first year and second year students
- From the academic year 2013-14, University has changed the pattern of exam from 60:40 to 75:25 which is followed by the College
- Internal test is conducted for 20 marks and for 5 marks the subject teachers evaluate the students on the basis of their classroom participation, attendance and conduct
- From the academic year 2015-16, internal exam for 20 marks in some specialized courses are kept optional as per University norms
- From the academic year 2016-17, University has implemented 100% evaluation process for the F.Y.B Com and F.Y.B.A programs. The University has decided to conduct the exam of F.Y. B.Com and F. Y. B.A through a common exam timetable and common question paper set by the University

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The examination committee strictly adheres to the rules and regulations of the University for conducting exams, assessment of answer sheets and results.

- **Regular meetings:** Departmental meetings and staff meetings are conducted on regular basis to ensure effective communication and implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution
- Assessment: The question papers and answer sheets for the first and second year students are set as well as assessed by the subject teachers at the College level in the 'Centralised Assessment Program' (CAP) Centre of the College. For third year students, the question papers are set by the University and the answer sheets are assessed at the CAP centres. We are one of the few CAP centres for UG and PG examination.
- Reassessment, Revaluation and giving Photocopy: The College does have a mechanism for reassessment, revaluation and giving photocopy of assessed answer sheets to the first and second year students as per the direction of the University. The third year students have to apply directly to the University for the same.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples, which have positively impacted the system.

Details on formative evaluation:

Students are assessed periodically on the basis of their participation in other curricular activities, sports and class conduct. Assessment is done in the form of one minute talk, periodic class tests, report writing, book review and live models

Details on Summative evaluation:

- Exams per semester are conducted and according to their performance credits are assigned and transferred to next class
- \triangleright Question papers are set in such a way that $1/3^{rd}$ caters to the advanced learners, $1/3^{rd}$ to the slow learners and rest $1/3^{rd}$ to average learners
- > The formative and summative evaluation approaches have a positive impact on the system. There has been an improvement in the passing of the students.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in internal assessment during last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightages for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skill etc)

The Internal evaluation process has brought noteworthy changes in the development of knowledge and skills of students. It has motivated the students to be pro-active learners. To ensure transparency the following practices are adopted:-

- Project/assignment topics are given to the students well in advance
- Subject teacher conducts presentation/viva/debate in the presence of the class
- Internal examinations are conducted as per fixed schedule
- Internal test papers are set as per university pattern with multiple sets
- Marks are assigned for classroom participation, communication and conduct of the student

Strict adherence to the rules and regulations followed by the College brings a sense of self- control and discipline among the students. NCC, NSS, DLLE, WDEC hone their life-long learning skills. Student's experience in managing various activities cultivates reflective thinking and helps in surmounting challenges. Activities like 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan', Beautification of Kandivli station platform No.1, participation in Jan-Dhan Yojana has assisted in fulfilling the national objectives. Presentation, group discussion, debates, elocution competition, newspaper in classroom, research seminars train them in developing effective communication skills. Social Impact Committee, Nature Club, NSS, inculcate environmental and social sensitivity. Intercultural awareness and understanding is developed through the participation in intra-College and intercollegiate festivals. Use of **Band community**, personalised blogs, Whatsapp groups and College website makes them more tech savvy. International perspectives and professional skills are developed through projects, assignments, activities of Kskool, internship program, participation in international conferences and seminars, field visits and exposure to e-resources and e-database.

- Students are given an opportunity to apply, within 7 days from the date of declaration of results, for a **photocopy** of assessed answer sheets and then the mechanism of revaluation and verification of marks is adopted as per university guidelines
- With respect to University exam, the College forwards the grievances to the University and pursues them for speedy redressal

2.6 STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1 Does the College have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes', give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the College has well defined learning outcomes for each course. The same is communicated at the beginning of the academic year to the students and the staff during the orientation program, classroom interaction and departmental meetings.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The College monitors the progress and performance of the students through summative and formative evaluation process. Class teachers, as mentors continuously monitor the progress of the students during their classroom interactions. Progression index of individual student is prepared to evaluate their performance throughout the programme, which helps in understanding the achievement pattern of the student. This helps the teachers to identify the problems of the students and accordingly corrective measures are taken. Remedial lectures are conducted for slow learners and advanced learners are recommended to use reference material and are encouraged to take up add-on courses. IQAC plays a key role in ensuring all round quality progress of the students. The progress and performance of the students is communicated to the students and their parents through College website, SMSes, notice board and during the Parents meetings.

Participatory learning techniques like seminars, projects, assignments, group discussions and expert lectures makes the subject interesting, easy and relevant to recent times. **Educational field visits and industrial visits** are organized to bridge the gap between academic learning and real corporate world. **Remedial lectures** and **Bridge courses** are recommended to the slow learners. Special efforts are taken to improve the performance of advanced learners.

The College has a state-of-art infrastructure and follows innovative teaching techniques building a safe and invigorating learning environment for the students. Academic Calendar and teaching plans are prepared well in advance, which facilitates the achievement of intended learning outcomes.

The assessment strategies followed by the College are in accordance with university guidelines. The College **results are above average** as compared to the university results, which reflects students and teachers active participation in teaching-learning process. An active participation and co-operation of all the stakeholders in restructuring the teaching, learning and assessment strategies ensures the achievement of academic excellence of the College.

The College has taken following measures to enhance the social and economical relevance.

Social relevance:

The College ensures parity and equality amongst the students and teachers. A fair and transparent administration is our key to success.  - ➤ Entrepreneurship Development Cell motivates students to become successful entrepreneurs to attain Prime Minister's vision of 'Make in India' by giving practical projects and assignments. Start-up fund is given to the students to start their business

2.6.5. How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The College collects and analyses student performance data at two levels i.e. the Internal Assessment and the External Assessment. The College collects data of student performance and learning outcomes through an internal test, group discussion, presentation, quiz, assignment etc as per university norms for **internal assessment and semester end examination** for external assessment. At the final year examination, the data of our College students' performance (per subject) is compared with data of University performance to evaluate the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process of the College. The Principal conducts **review meeting** of all departments to discuss result analysis in detail and to take corrective measures to improvise the same. **Progression index** and a record of the profile of students maintained by the class teachers helps in understanding the performance of the students and the attainment of learning outcomes. **Happiness Index** and Placement of graduate students helps to gauge the need gap and accordingly initiatives are taken to develop soft skills, communication skills and interpersonal skills.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The College monitors the achievement of learning outcomes through continuous assessment, classroom interactions and discussions. IQAC monitors the teaching-learning process ensuring the achievement of learning outcomes. **Happiness Index** helps in assessing the attainment of learning outcomes. The teachers recommend books related to their research work which are approved and purchased by library. College library conducts **training sessions** for research scholars on usage of software such as OPAC, SLIM-21, Databases etc.
- Every Staff room is equipped with computer and printer facility. The College has three air conditioned computer labs with 102 computers and internet facility.
- Administrative, clerical and technical support is also provided to the research scholars.
- The Research scholars are granted special leaves (if required) for carrying out research related activities.

Management encourages research among students and generously sponsors the Students' Research Conference. Institute tries to meet the expenditure through registration fees, however management meets the deficit. Management provides financial support in organizing research conference for students. They also sponsor the travel grant and registration fees of the students at national and International Conferences. If required for the Students Research Conference, the registration fee is nominal.

To encourage interdisciplinary research the College has a healthy system of organizing research conferences, seminars by engaging two or more departments like Department of Commerce and Department of Accounting & Finance came together to organise an International conference. Department of Hindi and Learning Resource centre jointly organized Hindi international conference.

Department of Geography and Information Technology is organizing workshop on Geographical Information Systems (GIS). Similarly, Department of Economics and Department of Banking & Insurance are organizing a national conference in the coming year.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College has organized a national level conference, resulting into churning up research ideas from various disciplines from other parts of India. We have been receiving a good response from researchers from all over country.

Challenges

- Getting good quality research paper
- Although the response is very good but many research papers stands rejected either due to quality or plagiarism issue.
- Getting research grant from concerned authorities.

3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

A well-equipped, air conditioned Learning Resource Centre (LRC) with a special collection of books on research methodology. The Learning resource centre also shares facility of internet, Wi-Fi, printer to students. Different e-resources are available to the students through Databases such as Indiastat.com, Taxman.com. Membership of N-List program of INFIBNET and British Council Library (BCL) provide access to rich research resources. Besides NLIST E-Journals, SPSS, Kindle lab, Inter- Library Loan facility is available. Training sessions are arranged for staff and students to upgrade their knowledge on available e-resource database. A lecture was arranged on 'Online Research Strategies'. The College has 3 well equipped computer labs with around 102 computers with internet, printing and reprography facilities, 2 more computer labs are in the offing. Each department is provided with computers and internet facility.

1) "An Empirical Study on Slum Development in Mumbai Suburb Area" by Jatin Patel

Some of the Suggestions provided by the researcher, which aimed at improving community service, are:

- More employment opportunities should be created in rural areas of Maharashtra
- Maharashtra government may regularize already dwelled slum and to curb further expansion of slums for which a Monitoring Mechanism is required
- There is need to bring more accountability to speed up the procedure. Government departments/officer in charge should be held responsible for delay in approval. Developers should be penalized for delay in completion of projects
- 2) "A Comparative Study of Consumer Behaviour in Malls and Local Vendors with special reference to fast moving consumer goods (FMCG) with special reference to Mumbai (2006-11)" by Vanitha Esaimani
 - The thesis has tried to give a solution to the mall owners and local marketers to understand the behavior of consumers, which can help them in formulating a strategy to tap more and more consumers.
 - The need of the hour is to re-engineer the operations of the kirana stores; otherwise, the big giants will leave no space for them to grow.
 - The government should make obtainable credit at cheap rates from banks and micro-credit establishments for enlargement and modernization of ancient retailers.

- The Government must take initiatives to consider all uncovered aspects with stress on hygiene, convenience to shopper etc.
- To enhance sales during boom periods all mall house owners, corporations ought to provide promotion schemes like free gifts, discounts etc.

3) DLLE - Department of Life Long learning & Extension Program

DLLE conducted a survey in Municipal school to gauge the level of language skills - Listening, Speaking, Reading & Writing among the students. The finding was that the children were not proficient in all these areas and therefore the DLLE volunteers under took the task of upgrading and enhancing their skills in listening, speaking, reading, writing.

4) Damu Nagar Survey

A survey was conducted by KES Shroff College and Pragati Mitra Mandal to find out the number of people suffered in Damu Nagar Fire at Kandivli (E), Mumbai. College collected the information and distributed required clothes and other items to them. On the basis of information provided by the Headmaster of Raj High School 425 uniforms were given to the affected students from KG to 10^{th} Standard.



3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

The institution promotes institution-neighbourhood- community network and student engagement through various following activities:

At Institution level:

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities, which promote citizenship roles?

NSS unit has a record book/ Diary in which every member keeps record of their activities. Apart from that, we have around 33 associations under a teacher in charge. Regular records are maintained which is checked and counter signed by the Principal. Records of the activities are maintained in the College magazine and also in the form of videos and photos.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

A visitor's book is maintained at the reception desk. Stakeholders' perception is solicited during meetings with parents and management committee members. We regularly get views from the local authorities like Municipal Corporators, local corporators, social workers, Member of Legislative assembly (MLA) and other official bodies like Police Station, Regional Transport Office (RTO). Stakeholders attend programmes on 15thAugust and 26th January and apprise us on our good work for the community and society.

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

NSS, NCC, DLLE, SIC, NATURE CLUB, YOUTH FORUM and all other associations plan and organise their activities at the beginning of every academic year. No specific budget is allocated but management is always willing to spend on extension and outreach activities like Rs. 5,93,000/- were spent on cleanliness and beautification of Platform No. 1, Kandivli railway station. Around Rs.1,35,000/- were spent on Damu Nagar slums. A specific budget is allocated for the extension activities of NSS. DLLE volunteers are also involved in the extension activities. All these activities instill social responsibility and also sensitize the students on social issues.

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC, DLLE and other National / International agencies?

Various associations such as NCC, NSS, DLLEP, Rotaract, etc. conduct various extension activities. A teacher is appointed as convener/ chairperson of each Committee. These associations undertakes membership drive at the beginning of every academic year. Participation of students' is promoted by conducting orientation, induction lectures and mouth publicity. Notices are circulated in the classrooms and displayed on the notice boards. Digital boards are used to disseminate information. Posters are displayed in the campus and Standees are prominently placed at the College entrance gate. To encourage participation, photos and videos of the activities are shown on the Knowledge Dissemination Board and their rewards and recognitions are displayed on the 'Wall of Fame', it is also included in the College magazine, Kandivlite.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the College to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

The following are few social surveys, research and extension work undertaken by the College:

- NSS has conducted a survey on the drop out of school children in the adopted area of Iraniwadi. Survey of 55 families was conducted in which it was found that 8 children were school dropout.
- DLLE conducted the survey in Municipal school to gauge the level of language skills (Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing) among the students. It was found that the children were not proficient in all these areas and therefore the DLLE volunteers under took the task of upgrading and enhancing their skills in

listening, speaking, reading and writing.

- 'Joy of Giving Fortnight' is observed every year by SIC of the College to sensitize the students about the weaker section of the society and to make them realize that their small help can support a big cause. Faculties and students contribute generously and the collected items are distributed in the two orphanages adopted by the College in Snehalaya Sadan, Vasai and Vidhayak Sansad Bhavan, Virar.
- Clothes and other items were distributed to the deprived and needy people and also to the affected people of Damu Nagar slums in Kandivli East, which was completely destroyed by fire.
- NSS and Cine & Dramatics society organizes Street plays every year on various social issues such as 'Women Empowerment', 'Difficulties of Middle class people', 'Corruption' etc.
- 'River March' was organized in association with an NGO 'Revoluters' and Rotaract Club for river rejuvenation of Kandivli area. Around 160 students with one faculty participated in Walkathon organized for the same purpose.
- Women Development Cell screened the documentary on 'Save the Girl Child' and also organized a workshop on 'Know Your Rights'

4.1 Physical Facilities:

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The College focuses on student-centered learning through opening new avenues and initiating challenging courses to meet the requirements of the students. Our students are the cynosure of our eyes; hence, student-centric infrastructure is facilitated. Taking into consideration the natural growth of the existing courses and getting opportunities to start new divisions/courses each year, infrastructural requirements are well estimated and planned and are put forth to the management. The same is placed before the Local Management Committee (LMC) of the College for approval. Approved infrastructural requirements are included in the budget. This procedure has helped us to improve the state of infrastructure from time to time. Now, the College has 56 well-furnished classrooms, spacious air conditioned library with good collection of resources, 5 well-equipped computer labs with internet facility, electronics lab, geography lab, language lab and Kindle Lab that facilitate effective teaching and learning. New addition, expansion and renovation of rooms (classrooms, staff rooms, storerooms, laboratories, conference room etc.) are carried out during vacations to avoid the disturbance during lecture time. Whenever possible, new construction is undertaken to fulfill the requirements.

All classrooms are equipped with projectors and teachers are provided laptops for delivering lectures. Computers with internet facility are provided in the staff rooms and library to facilitate research by the faculty and the students too.

College added six new courses [Bachelor of Environment The has Management(BEM), Bachelor of Investment Management(BIM), BA in Film and Television Media (BAFTM), MA in Film and Television Media (MAFTM), MSc in Information Technology (MSc (IT), MA (Business Economics)] in the last 4 years. NCC Studies as an optional subject has been introduced from 2014-15 in BCom. Six new divisions have also been started from 2013-14[One division each in BCom(Accounting and Finance), Bachelor of Management Studies(BMS), Bachelor of Mass Media(BMM) and BSc (IT) and two divisions in BCom]. The College ensures that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized. Undergraduate lectures are conducted in the morning session (7.00 am to 3.30 pm) whereas postgraduate lectures in commerce and Personal Contact Programme (PCP) of Institute of Distance & Open Learning (IDOL) of University of Mumbai are conducted in the evening.

Following are some of the examples of the **facilities developed and augmented during last four years** to meet the demands of academic growth of the institution.

Administrative Office: Additional administrative office has been opened on the ground floor and one in the annexe building to facilitate the students.

Computer Labs: Two well-furnished computer labs are constructed – one at the main building with 32 computers and second at the annexe building with 26 computers.

Library: The library has switched over to professional library software 'SLIM 21' from October 2015. The stack area is vertically expanded to stack additional books.

Staff Room: The third-floor staff room is expanded to accommodate all the staff members. One more staff room is added in the annexe building for the teachers of the self-financed courses.

Exam Room: Exam Room is equipped with two automatic copiers with a capacity of 90 prints per minute.

Storeroom: Modern storage equipment 'Compactor' is installed in the storeroom and a mezzanine floor is constructed in the storeroom.

Studio: On the basis of the needs assessment of BMM, BAFTM and MAFTM courses, a state-of-the-art audio-visual studio has been set up.

Sound Recording and Editing Lab: A high-tech sound recording and editing lab has been set up.

Class Rooms: The institution has added 19 well-equipped air conditioned classrooms in the annexe building and 3 classrooms in the main building to keep pace with the academic growth.

The facilities are listed below:

- **IQAC:** IQAC room with required facilities is available on 2nd floor.
- Grievance Redressal Unit: The College has Grievance Redressal committee consisting of Vice Principal as the Chairperson. All the meetings of the committee are held in the Vice-Principal's Cabin.
- Women's Cell: The room for the Women Development and Empowerment Cell is on the ground floor.
- Counseling and Career Guidance: Has a room on the ground floor.
- Placement Unit: We have Kskool, which conducts skill development programme for the students and looks after their placement. The room for the same is on the first floor.
- Canteen: The College has a spacious canteen with TV on the ground floor in main as well as the annexe building where students and staff get healthy food at reasonable rates.
- Recreational spaces for staff and students: We have separate Common Room for girls and boys on the ground floor. We have four air-conditioned staff rooms with refrigerator, microwave, water filter and TV. Gymkhana and gymnasium are open for staff members and students both.
- Safe drinking water facility: Water Purifiers are installed on each floor and the canteens.
- Auditorium: The College conducts all its cultural events in the air conditioned Maghanmal Pancholia Hall.
- **Two mini auditoriums:** Various departmental activities such as seminars, workshops, presentations, symposiums etc. are conducted in the mini auditoriums.
- Multipurpose Hall: It is used for conducting various curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.



4.2.3 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during last four years?

The following procedure is followed for purchasing new titles / journals:

- Librarian circulates catalogue to the Principal and teachers.
- Request for books from the Principal, teachers and students is received.
- Books are also procured on approval from the suppliers; challan is retained in the Library.
- Books are shown to the teachers for approval.
- Once the books are selected, the Principal's approval is taken. The librarian checks that the same titles do not exist in the library.
- List of books approved is prepared and forwarded to the supplier along with the purchase order.
- Books not approved are returned to the supplier and challan is accordingly rectified.
- The supplier sends the bill for payment on the basis of corrected challan.

- After the bill is approved by the Principal, the same is sent to the accounts department with payment instruction.
- Librarian gives a list of those periodicals to the principal whose subscription is to be renewed or new periodicals are to be subscribed.
- Principal returns the list with her recommendations.
- Librarian sends the subscription for the approved periodicals to the suppliers.

Besides this,

- Book exhibition is organized every year to provide a glimpse of the current titles.
- The librarian and the staff also visit book fairs, bookstalls and book exhibitions to select and procure current titles, important journals and other reading materials.
- The librarian is in constant touch with fellow librarians, vendors and publishers who keep her informed about the latest titles and journals, which provide information, which are then approved by the Principal for procurement.
- The faculty also enjoys the freedom to buy books offsite for the library.
- For usage of current titles and journals, the list and new arrivals are displayed on the Library notice board.

In order to provide maximum access to the library collections following ICT-enabled tools and services are deployed in the library.

- **OPAC:** Online Public Access Catalogue is provided on the intranet in the library. Two terminals are provided for the same wherein the user retrieves the bibliographic details to locate books.
- Electronic Resources management package for e-Journals: Not available.
- Federated searching tools to search articles in multiple databases: Not available.
- **Library Website:** Separate library website http://kesshroffcollegelibrary.webs.com is regularly updated and the link of this website is also given to the College website http://www.kesshroffcollege.com
- In-house/remote access to e-publications: In-house (i.e. in the College premises) access to e-publications, subscribed by the College library, is provided to the

students at the Internet Hub having 14 terminals. The staff members have an access to e-publications in the separate reading room having internet facility in the library. Access to databases (www.indiastat.com and www.taxmann.com) and subscribed E-publications of INFLIBNET through user ID and password in the library as well as from remote location is available.

- **Library Automation:** The library was using SMS Library Management System of MICM Net-Solutions Pvt. Ltd. till September 2015. From October 2015 the library is using **SLIM21** (System for Library Information Management) of Algorhythms Consultants Pvt. Ltd. The modules like Cataloguing, Circulation, Acquisition and Serial Control System and Web OPAC are operational in the Library.

- ILL (Inter Library Loan): We provide inter library loan facility to the readers. We share our books on request with the library of the colleges in the nearby

vicinity. We allow teachers and students of other colleges to use our library. The Ex-students of the College appearing for CA, CS exams also seek our library help by submitting a written request. The students of other colleges are provided a photocopy of the syllabus for the transcript.

- Information deployment and Notification: The library notices are displayed on the Library Notice board at the entrance of the library as well as on the library website.
- **Download:** Documents required for study and research can be downloaded from various search engines. The database subscribed by the library also has the facilities to download various articles and data.
- **Printing:** The library provides printing facility to its users at a nominal cost.
- **Reading List/Bibliography Compilation:** Reading list/Bibliography compilation is provided by the library on request to the users.
- In-House/remote access to e-resources: The library has an Internet Hub having 14 PCs where the users are provided in-house access to e-resources. List of important educational websites, User ID and password of online journals and databases are displayed in the internet hub for easy access. This enables easy access to various e-resources.
- User Orientation and Awareness: Library conducts orientation sessions for the students of new batches to acquaint them with the library collection and facilities thus motivating them to visit the library frequently. The library staff also briefs them with the rules and regulations to be followed while using the library facilities.
- Assistance in searching Databases: The library staff assists the users in searching databases.
- **INFLIBNET/IUC Facilities:** The library is having a membership of N-List programme of INFLIBNET.

Library staff assists the visually/physically challenged persons for the issue of books and other procedures of the library. The staff also helps in making an arrangement of audio lectures in the Internet Hub. Library also has audio books. One reading table is reserved for 'Divyang' (differently abled) students at the entrance of the library.

The library has a suggestion box wherein the students/faculty can drop complaints or suggestions. A structured questionnaire is also provided to students and staff for receiving the feedback about the library facilities. The feedback is analysed and remedial steps are taken.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the College?

- The College has Maintenance Officer who looks after the upkeep of infrastructure, facilities and equipment with the help of skilled workers.
- Housekeeping staff is appointed to keep the campus sparkling clean.
- Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) is given for lift, computer, air conditioners, gardening and website maintenance.
- AMC is given for pest control and fire extinguishers.
- Repair and maintenance of electrical equipments and furniture are done on call basis.

- Four computer lab attendants take care of the computers, allied gadgets, installation, maintenance of LAN and Internet.
- 120 Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) cameras are installed in the main College building and 70 in the annexe building to monitor and record campus movement for the purpose of safety and security.
- Watchmen for security are made available 24X7 in the College.
- Discipline Officer is appointed to maintain the discipline in the College.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

The College has few instruments, which require calibration, but as **the cost of calibration is more than the cost of new instrument**, calibration is not done and a new instrument is bought as and when required.





























Criterion V Student Support and Progression

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

Office charter, prominently displayed, provides all the important information regarding procedures and deadlines for examinations, admission, fees payment etc.

Additionally, plaques have been installed for quick and easy access of the following information –

- Vision and mission of College
- Floor wise plan of College infrastructure
- General rules and regulations of semester end examination system
- List of office staff
- University attendance rules posted in each class room
- Activities of College are notified on electronic boards

Also, banners and posters are periodically displayed to instill among students various disciplinary aspects of College such as ban on use of mobiles, wearing College identity card, ensuring cleanliness around campus etc.

B) Ensuring commitment and accountability

The institution considers the information disseminated to students as its commitment to them and believes that it is accountable in its timely execution. The following ways ensure its execution and accountability -

1. Displaying academic calendar

Academic calendar is prepared to ensure timely conduct of exams and other activities.

2. Formation of associations and committees

To ensure the smooth conduct of student-related activities 26 associations and committees are formed, and this decentralised manner of functioning helps in executing a wide range of curricular and co-curricular activities for students.

3. Conducting review meetings

Periodic review of all activities is sought from the respective association in - charge during staff meetings to ensure smooth conduct and participation.

4. Dispatching intimation letters to defaulters

Intimation letters are dispatched to defaulters periodically. Also parent-teacher meetings are held regularly.

5. Appointment of discipline officer

Discipline officer is appointed to ensure discipline in campus.

6. Display of merit list (as per university guidelines)

Merit list is displayed to ensure transparency in admission process

a. Support services for students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

The College is committed to aid the students belonging to SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections. We offer several schemes such as Scholarship scheme, library Book bank scheme to facilitate them in their academic pursuits. EBC students are offered Economic Backward Class scholarship. Also, teachers distribute spare copies of specimen textbooks to needy students

b. Facilities for students with physical disabilities

Students with physical disability are exempted from paying fees. Several infrastructural measures such as lifts and ramps ensure the smooth and hassle-free movement of such students. Toilets are specially designed for their convenience.

c. Overseas students

N.A (We do not have any overseas students in last four years).

d. Facilities for students to participate in various competitions (National and International).

Our management makes budgetary allocation specially to encourage students to upgrade sports and performing arts standards. Experts, Coaches and Choreographers are also appointed for the same. College takes care of the total expenses on students' kit, costumes, entry fees, travelling expenses and food. Apart from the above, the following additional steps are taken to encourage students:

- Reservation of seats for admission for sports, NCC and cultural students.
- Professional training by expert coaches and choreographers to participants.
- Provision of lunch and breakfast, if they stay in campus for long hours.
- Academic support in the form of additional examinations, special guidance to make up for the lectures missed due to sports and cultural activities.
- Felicitating students for outstanding achievement on Annual day.
- Physical fitness workshop.
- Time to time intimation about the events schedule.

e. Facility of medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

Students are covered by group insurance scheme. There is also a doctor on call for staff and students. First aid box is available for any minor injuries.

f. Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

The institution does not directly undertake the coaching of the students who undertake competitive examinations. However, our Library and information centre is well equipped with various books on these different exams and the teachers provide guidance as and when students seek while preparing for these competitive examinations. Also, Career Guidance cell conducts mock tests/group discussions for various entrance and qualifying examinations.

g. Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,) Establishment of KSkool

With the aim of skill development of students, KSkool-the career school was established in the year 2013-14. The school organises 'Graduate Skill Development Program' to prepare them for corporate jobs. The programme focuses on Personal Grooming, Essential Etiquette, Public Speaking, Presentation Skills, Managing self as well as teams, Resume Building, Group Discussions and Personal Interviews.

Initiatives by the Department of Business communication

The department of Business Communication is committed to develop communication skills among students and towards this aim carries out the following activities -

- 1. Language laboratory provides training in English pronunciation and listening skills.
- 1. Conduct of activities such as group discussions and power point presentation aim to improve communication and presentation skills of students.

- 2. 'Speak on stage' activity is organised where every student present in the class is asked come on stage to speak. The activity aims to eliminate stage fear among students and develop their confidence.
- 3. Feedback sessions are held at the end of the lecture in order encourage students to speak in the class fearlessly.

Following add on courses are also made available to enhance students' skill and practical knowledge –

- Diploma in Retail Management
- Certificate, Diploma, Advanced diploma in Travel Tourism
- Certificate, Diploma, Advanced diploma in Tax procedure and Audit
- Certificate course in Banking and Equity Market' offered by National development skill council, Ministry of HRD and BSE
- Diploma in Direct tax
- Diploma Indirect tax course
- Certificate course in Advanced Excel
- Certificate course Ethical Hacking
- Saral Hindi course to promote our national language
- Diploma in Banking and Finance in collaboration with Indian Institute of Banking & Finance
- Animation courses in collaboration with Academic of Digital Arts
- Accounting course in collaboration with Association of Chartered Certified Accountant
- A course in Fashion Designing in collaboration with Kashida Fashion

h. Support for slow learners

Slow learners are identified by the respective class teachers based on their academic performance and they are encouraged to attend the remedial lectures organised by the concerned department. Advanced learners are also encouraged to help slow learners. While setting question papers, teachers are instructed to keep one third of the question paper keeping in mind the slow learners. Additionally, students with learning disabilities are provided additional time during exam. Writers for exams are provided whenever required, as per the rules.

i. Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning / corporate / business house etc.

Every year the College organises exposure visits as well as industrial visits to various companies and manufacturing plants across India such as Bengaluru, Mysore, Pune, Silvasa, Hyderabad, Jaipur etc. Visits to Reserve bank of India, High court, Vidhan sabha, IBS, Times of India are also organised.

j. Publication of student magazines

The literary and technical pursuits of the students are manifested in the form of four College publications namely the College annual magazine *The Kandivlite*, *The United Colours of KES*, the newsletter of the BMM students, and *Evoke*, the newsletter of the Cultural Association and *BANCA* – the newsletter of Banking & Insurance Department.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

In order to encourage entrepreneurial spirit among students, KSkool organized a 'student entrepreneurship competition called 'KSkool Kapital'. During the competition, students presented their novel ideas by preparing a business plan. The three best business plans were awarded with the prize money of Rs. 20,000/-, Rs. 10,000/- and Rs. 5,000/- respectively. Entrepreneurial Development cell is also established.

As independence is the bedrock of any entrepreneurial endeavor, the College encourages the spirit of independence by giving complete freedom to the students to organise various activities. All program / activities conducted are 'by the students, for the students and of the students'.

- Organising 'Annapurna Day' enables students to develop their entrepreneurial skills wherein they learn to produce, to market, to advertise & sell their products and calculate their profit or loss at the end of the day. Cash Prizes were given in three categories
- Organising mega events like Annual Dayand inter collegiate festivals like Chakravuha, Oasis, Sapphire and inter collegiate sports help them in developing event management skills.
- Various activities under NCC and NSS enables students to sharpen their leadership skills.
- 5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution, which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

To promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities we undertake the following steps –

1. Formation of associations and committees

Focused on various extracurricular and co-curricular activities various associations and committees are formed such as Cultural association, Mathema, Arthcharitra, Debating Society, Youth Forum, Rotaract club etc. The activities of these associations are widely promoted through circulation of notices, pasting of posters across campus, formal listing on notice boards, websites, counters at the gate to create awareness and to encourage students to participate. Teachers also counsel and motivate students to participate in these activities.

2. Providing monetary support and professional trainers and fulfilling dietary and other requirements

College takes care of **the total expenses** on students' kit, costumes, entry fees, travelling expenses and food. To participate in intercollegiate competitions students are given full monetary support. Professional training is provided by expert coaches and choreographers, directors to train the students for various inter-collegiate competitions. NCC cadets are provided special diet to maintain

their physical fitness. The College sponsors track suit, sports shoes and uniform for NCC and sports students respectively.

3. Flexibility in examination and additional academic support (as per University guidelines)

Academic support in the form of **additional examinations**, special guidance to make up for the lectures missed due to sports and cultural activities.

4. Rewarding the achievers

The strategy of appreciation and reward is employed and students are recognised and rewarded for their co – curricular achievements at the annual function as well as at the various functions held all round the year. The list of winners of various events/activities is published in the popular College annual magazine 'Kandivlite'. **Wall of fame** board proudly displays the all round achievers of the College.

5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIRNET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

The institution does not directly undertake the coaching of the students who take examinations However, our Library and information centre is well equipped with various books on these different exams and the teachers provide guidance as and when the students seek while preparing for these competitive examinations. Also, career guidance cell conducts mock tests for various entrance and qualifying examinations. Students appearing for CA examinations are given classroom attendance requirement. They are also provided over-night reading facilities in the College.

One of our NCC cadets Vinay Pandey has joined **the Indian Army. Bharat Waghela** secured **17**th **all India rank** in examinations held by Institute of Company secretaries of India (ICSI). In the past four years, four students passed all the levels of Chartered accountancy examination conducted by ICAI.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho – social etc.)

The College has appointed a **trained counselor** to address the emotional needs of the students. The principal and the class teachers attend to the grievances of the students and counsel the students and parents by meeting them whenever necessary. A parent – teacher meeting is called twice in an academic year to inform the parents about the attendance position of their children and parents are briefed regarding the academic progress.

Academic counseling

For academic guidance, during admissions faculty members follow cafeteria approach. They counsel the students regarding various courses available, and which course to choose.

Career counseling

The College has its own placement school 'KSkool' run under the guidance of Mr. Vishwas Nair, recruited with a salary package of Rs 1,00,000 per month. The 'K Skool' conducts soft skill development training programmes for all the students of every class and division in the campus. The students have found placements in well known organizations like ICICI, HDFC etc. 'KSkool' is a mandatory development cum training programme for all the students. In the year 2013-14, **100 students** were placed at ICICI Bank, HDFC Bank, Vijay Sales, Just Dial and Chola MFS. In the year 2014-15, **150 students** were placed with ICICI Bank and TCS. In November 2015, KSkool organized an annual job fair where organizations like Angel Broking, ICICI Securities, ITM, TimesPro and Creative Keedaz participated as campus recruiters and selected 125 students in a single day making it one of the largest undergrad recruitment drive for a College in Mumbai. Total **191 students** were successfully selected for placements in 2015-16.

Kskool's skill development program include:

1st year – career management, resume building, job site management.

2nd year – public speaking, presentation skills, personality development.

3rd year – personal interviews, group discussions, team management.

Personal training and counseling

In the year 2014-15, 90 students successfully completed the National Development Skill Council's course of 'Banking and Equity Market Course' under the aegis of Ministry of HRD and BSE. In the same year, 250 students received training in English speaking Course. 55 students were trained by the Microsoft Training Corporation in network security and ethical training in our College.

The College has appointed a counselor to attend to the students' problem. The class teacher also plays the role of a mentor. Stress management lectures are also arranged for students

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If 'yes', list (if any) the grievances reported to and redressed during the last four years.

The College has a grievance redressal cell. The members of the cell attend to the grievances of the students for instance time table was rescheduled for second year banking and insurance students, I-card lanyards were replaced on the basis of students complaints.

Feedback and complaints regarding infrastructure such as installation of more fans in classrooms, replacement of chairs in the library etc were redressed. However, no major complaints of severe nature have been received by the grievance cell in the past four years.

The College has a Women Development and Empowerment Cell (WDEC), which organizes gender sensitization programmes and also educates against any sexual harassment problems, fortunately the College has never experienced any such problems or complaints.

There exists a committee as per the UGC guidelines. However, no ragging case has been reported since the beginning of the college.

The College floats large number of welfare schemes for the students as mentioned below:

- Vidyotejak is our flagship welfare scholarship scheme under which needy students' fees are sponsored
- For SC/ST candidates the College is instrumental in getting freeship to the students from the Ministry of Social Welfare
- Students are allowed to pay fees in installments.
- There are scholarships for students under sponsorship programmes like Educare, and KES Alumni wherein the needy students' fees are sponsored by the management, trustees, teaching staff and alumni members.
- There is a **state government insurance scheme** sponsored by the government of Maharashtra covering all the students
- Besides monetary assistance, the College provides many other facilities to our students like clean drinking water facilities, gold library card, kindle hub, internet facility in library and special reading rooms.
- Entire expenses of travel, registration fees, sports kits, NCC uniforms are borne by the College for students participating at university, zonal, state, national and international levels.
- College has appointed professional trainers such as sports coaches and choreographers, directors to guide participants of various extra- and co-curricular activities.
- Every Wednesday the NCC cadets are given special diet. Food allowances are also given to students who participate in extra and co-curricular activities.
- There is a **reasonable priced canteen** facility.

In the above table, NA stands for "**Not available**". Our passing percent has always been better from the university pass percent, except for BMM course in the year 2013-14.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and / or towards employment?

To facilitate student progression to higher level of education various enrichment courses are added to enhance the students' skill set. To name few:

- Diploma in Retail Management
- Diploma in Direct Taxation
- Diploma in Indirect Taxation
- Diploma in Travel and Tourism

The College also has collaborations with various institutions to run add-on course such as animation courses by Arena Animation, a course in fashion designing by Kashida Fashion and Diploma in Banking by Indian institute of Banking and Finance. Personal counseling by teachers and counselor enable them to select right course and career to enhance and facilitate them to progress further to higher level. Faculty also provides recommendation letters to students who wish to pursue higher education or seek jobs.

To ensure holistic development of students and to groom them, the College established KSkool in year 2013-14. KSkool imparts training on employability skills, soft skills, personality development, resume writing, teamwork and group dynamics so as to enable them to achieve their career goals, as already mentioned under question no. 5.1.8.

Experts from industries are called to share their success stories for inspiring our students.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The following support services are provided for academically weak and drop out students:

Academically weak students

- Remedial lectures are conducted for students who are at risk of failure.
- Preliminary exam and class test are conducted for Third Year students.
- Bridge course by the department of Mathematics to help students who are weak in the subject.
- Extra lectures are organised as per the demands of the students.
- Students are counseled on the techniques of writing exams by respective subject teachers.
- Special lectures on communication skills are conducted for students.

Dropout students

- To reduce attendance defaulters, attendance committee sends letters and sms alerts to parents every month to inform them about their ward's attendance report. Parent-teacher meetings are called to inform them about the consequences of not fulfilling the required attendance.
- Financially weak students are given benefits like payment of fees in installments, Government scholarships, Vidyotejak scheme, Educare scheme, etc. by College

staff and KES management, as our philosophy is that no student should become a dropout for the lack of financial resources.

For solving emotional and psycho-social problems of students, the College has appointed a counselor.

5.3 Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

Sports and other cultural activities play a very important role in overall personality development of the students. Therefore, every year College conducts different co-curricular and extracurricular activities. College also organizes different sports activities for the students such as Track and Field events, indoor games and outdoor games. College has an air conditioned gymkhana with a gymnasium. Various cultural competitions are organized for the students at intra and inter-collegiate level such as singing, dancing, acting, fine art etc. From the academic year, 2015-16 College initiated an intra collegiate festival among 11 undergraduate courses known as ANTARANG to promote inter-faculty competition in which 700 students participated. The main aim of this event is to hunt for and expose the hidden talent among the students.

- To enable the students to contribute positively to the growth and development of the institution as well as of the nation

It is very obvious from our Vision and Mission that the College aims at bringing holistic development through satisfying the emerging needs of the students. It also seeks to serve and sensitize students on various social issues.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The College is managed by KES, a progressive governing body having a track record of Eight decades. The Management has taken initiatives in introducing new courses, developing infrastructural facilities and motivating faculties to improve teaching-learning skills.

The Principal, as an academic and administrative head, plays a vital role in guiding the College to reach greater heights by bringing about a sea change in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, by introducing value added programmes, augmenting research, collaborations and expanding social outreach.

The information flows from bottom to top through various committees and office bearers. The College administration and action plans are executed through different Committees and associations.

For students' grievance, there is **Grievance Cell**, which attends the queries and grievances raised and they are solved effectively up to their satisfaction. Compliant boxes are installed in various places of College in which students can drop in written complaints. Boxes are opened once in 15 days by teacher in-charge of Grievance Cell. Complains received are recorded in Grievance Book and are brought forward to the Principal. The Principal calls meeting of Grievance Cell in which the modality of solving is decided. In case, the identity of complainant is revealed in complain, the students are

called and decisions are conveyed. Many-a-times oral grievances are attended and solved by one to one discuss with students and staff.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No court cases are filed by and against the College.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Computation of **Happiness Index** by the College was a step towards this direction. In most of the cases, the students share their feedback orally with the Principal. Students approach the authorities with written requests also. Principal places the same before the Vice-Principal, Head of Departments and the Course Coordinators for their suggestions. The academic matters raised by the students, which are general in nature are discussed in detail in the staff meeting and decisions for improvement are implemented.

Students' feedback on infrastructural facilities is discussed by the Principal in the students' representative meetings. Based on the discussion, Principal makes proposal for fund allocation and gets it endorsed by management and is then executed. Students' feedback about teachers is taken and analyzed by the Principal and communicated to the teachers in writing. Many-a-times a personal dialogue with the teachers is also indulged in. The Principal monitors the performance of the teachers by taking subsequent feedback.

The outcome is that this system of feedback forces introspection and improvement in performance of the teachers.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

In this technology driven era, the College is conscious about enhancing the knowledge level of teaching and non-teaching staff

- Organizing 'Train the Trainer' programme
- Conducting programme on SPSS and Advanced SPSS
- Sending teachers on specialized training programme like two teachers were send to Christ University, Bengaluru and four teachers were send to National Institute of Technology, Warangal for 10 days training on Flipped Classroom
- Organizing lectures on 'Online search strategies'
- Lecture on 'Time management is life management'
- A Teacher and Maintenance in-charge were sent to training on Solar Energy so
 that they have better insight into solar system integration which helped the
 College in installing solar paneling system
- Teachers attend corporate conferences to listen and interact with corporate czars.
 Such conferences are organized by 'The Economics Times' annually. Teachers from different departments are sent to get corporate exposure which definitely contributes to professional development

 Faculty Development Programme on 'Big Data – Hadoop' and 'Network Security' by ATS Learning Solutions, Microsoft Ltd. authorized education partner

Non-teaching staff

- Non teaching staff is given training on DTP techniques, latest version of Microsoft word and excel
- Microsoft Ltd. conducted workshop on 'Use of advanced excel software'
- Workshop on 'Advanced Excel' by ATS Learning Solutions, Microsoft Ltd. authorized education partner

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

As a means to empower the faculty for the role and responsibility they perform, the College always sends them to specialized workshop as a means to train and retrain in their respective niche areas. Example: the cultural in-charge is sent to **Kala Ghoda festival**. Cine and Dramatic in-charge is sent to various **Play shows**. Mass Media teacher is sent to studios and shooting event to learn from real onsite modalities. Nature club in-charge is sent for **Nature trails**. Teachers are sent to workshop on syllabus restructuring which recharges them.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

New format of **Academic Performance Index** is now made mandatory. A data analysis report is prepared for the evaluation of the performance by Head of Department then submitted to the Principal by the end of the academic year. Later, it is appraised by the Principal along with IQAC. The observations of the Principal about their academic activity are the benchmark for entrusting more responsible roles of leadership. Performance of the administrative staff is evaluated on the basis of the discussions in their meetings.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The performance appraisal reports enable the staff members to understand the diverse and changing needs of the students and also to recognize the measures that need to be taken to cater them. They also equip the administration to comprehend issues that require attention and take remedial measures.

Staff is rewarded for their better performance. In case of negative appraisal, it is communicated in writing to the staff members and suggestions for improvement are communicated to them by the Principal.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Teaching and non-teaching staffs are considered to be the backbone of the institution to bear its strain and stress. Understanding that satisfied staff is the success of an

institution, the College has taken all measures for ensuring the welfare of all the staff on roll (both permanent and temporary). In addition to the salary, following welfare schemes are in place:

- Management organizes 'Sadbhavana Divas'
- Travel grant for attending seminar/workshop/conference
- **Mediclaim** for unaided faculty
- **Loan** to non-teaching staff
- Seed money for minor research to unaided teaching staff
- Tea/snacks/lunch/dinner provided whenever staff works extra hours
- Fees exemption for ward of class IV employees
- Staff picnic

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The College has a very effective mechanism to monitor effective use of financial resources. Budget is prepared and placed before the LMC at the beginning of the academic year. Once endorsed in LMC, expenses are first sanctioned by the Principal. The Principal ensures that the expenses are incurred for the purpose of implementing institutional plans.

For requirement of equipments or other major items, requisition is submitted to purchase committee, which is headed by the Principal. Purchase committee invites tenders and quotations from various suppliers. Their quotations are evaluated, comparative statement is prepared, suppliers are called for personal discussion and after comparing all aspects from various suppliers, orders are placed. This ensures that right equipment is purchased at most competitive price.

Actual expenses incurred during the year are compared with the budgeted figures and any major variation is discussed by the Principal with the concerned person. Accounts of the institution are subject to internal and external audit.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance

- The KES Management has appointed an internal auditor CA Rohit Vishwakarma and external auditor CA Bharat Desai & Co.

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If yes, what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes, the College is having its **Internal Quality Assurance Cell**. The Cell was established on 21st August, 2010 and functions on the basis of the guidelines set forth by NAAC. It works towards improving and maintaining the quality of education, identifying and suggesting new ways of using teaching aids, developing suitable infrastructure and offering suggestions for the self-finance courses.

The IQAC meets quarterly - to plan, direct, implement and evaluate the teaching, research and publication activities in the College. Regular meetings of working committees are held. Full bench meeting is held at the end of the year. The subcommittees dealing with various activities implement the IQAC guidelines and report the feedback.

The College has prepared a **Perspective Plan** for the period of 10 years commencing from the academic year 2014-2015 to the academic year 2023-2024 by taking into consideration the quality indicators of Seven Criterion determined by NAAC. In the preparation of the Perspective Plan, IQAC of the College has taken initiatives. Inputs from all the stakeholders, their expectations, management policies and goals and objectives of the College are considered as a base for formulation of the perspective plan. The draft of the Perspective Plan is under discussion in the Local Managing Committee of the College.

Every year IQAC devises a yearly Perspective Plan in the beginning of the academic year and also gives an account of the outcome achieved at the end of the academic

year. Feedback from all the stakeholders and the recommendations of the IQAC are taken into consideration and innovations are incorporated in upcoming annual plans. Student feedback mechanism, self-appraisal by teachers, introduction of teachers training programmes, faculty improvement programmes, encouragement to teachers for research are some of the measures taken for quality sustenance and enhancement as a strategy.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The process of accreditation has inculcated quality consciousness among all the stakeholders. Regular meetings of IQAC result in valuable suggestions, which are approved by management and have been implemented. The decisions are listed below:

They have also contributed by suggesting certain quality enhancing parameters such as Happiness Index, Energy Audit, Gender Audit and Development Index. They also guide us in resolving grass root level issues.

The College is fortunate to have support of committed alumni whose contribution helps in realizing our quality initiatives. Alumni have contributed in enhancing the level of inter-collegiate festival – 'Chakrawyuha' by upgrading it to National level. Alumni share their experiences and help in receiving feedback.

Students contribute to the efficient functioning of IQAC by providing feedback on the teaching learning process. They also help in execution of IQAC plan.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The College had undertaken external audit in which two Peers conducted **Academic audit**. The College has applied for University audit but awaiting their visit.

Criterion VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

Mankind owes a moral responsibility to preserve the environment for the future generations as all have primary right to it. This belief can materialize only through conscious and committed efforts by today's generations. KES' Shroff College is conscious about the environment and intends to inculcate a sense of nature conservation and sustainable development among its students as well. Efforts are taken to make the College campus green. The College is sensitive to the fact that the resources are scarce and need to be preserved. Quality monitoring has been an integral part of the College functioning. The College extends education to its students through innovative and interesting ways to make them nature-conscious as well as nature-friendly. Very recently, the College has initiated a certificate course in Environmental Education.

7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a green audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, the College conducts green audit of its campus and facilities.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by College to make the campus Eco Friendly?

In a densely populated city like Mumbai where pollution levels are high, it is essential to practice environment consciousness. Educational institutions, bearing the moral responsibility of creating such awareness, act as a role model in envisioning the new generations to live in a healthy environment. Being eco-friendly is a challenge for us, especially due to the inherent limitations of urban area. However, we strive to create an eco-friendly campus, which we believe, is a pre-requisite of any developing and developed society. Following are the initiatives taken by the College to keep the campus eco-friendly:

- Energy Conservation: Our endeavor for energy conservation reached a new level with the conduct of energy audit of College building by M/s. Bhuva & Associates. Their observations and suggestions gave us a new insight about some simple-to-implement and innovative techniques to be adopted for optimum energy utilization. We are now replacing the convention bulbs and tube lights with LED bulbs in phases. Besides, the floor-in-charge peons ensure the switching off of lights, fans and appliances as soon as lectures are over. In addition to this, motivational slogans on energy conservation are put up in each classroom and all over. We have also installed inverter Aircons and even those with star rating.
- Use of Renewable Energy: Installation of solar lights is highly relevant in today's scenario as non-renewable sources of energy are facing the danger of exhaustion. In this regard, we took the initiative of installing solar lights to meet a portion of our energy requirement.
- **Biogas Plant:** For the last seven years, a biogas plant is in operation in KES' College canteen, turning wet waste into fuel equal to one LPG cylinder.
- Rainwater Harvesting: Rain Water Harvesting is a method of interlinking 'heaven and earth' and we do it in the right spirit. The rainwater harvesting mechanism installed in the College campus, is giving us some relief from the

- occasional water shortage faced. The College has undertaken water harvesting since last 8 years. It has two aspects:
- I) Ground water harvesting is done to recharge the ground water level that enhances the boring water level and the outcome is that we get good amount of water to be used in toilets etc. A well-charged bore-well ensured that we never face water shortage even in a severe drought year.
- II) We also indulge in rooftop water harvesting and the water so collected is then used for gardening purpose. This water is then used through sprinklers to make optimum use of the same. Additionally, to avoid wastage of water, we use sprinklers instead of using water pipe, which generally leads to excess watering.

Going an extra mile, even the water released from the air-conditioners is collected, conserved and utilized by housekeeping staff for mopping the floor. The maintenance in-charge regularly monitors the taps and any leakage found is immediately reported and rectified. Further, the students are constantly sensitized on putting off the taps when not required.

- Efforts for Carbon Neutrality: Since we do not undertake transportation, energy production or industrial processes, carbon neutrality has been of little concern. However, realising the role of trees in reducing carbon footprints, the College IQAC has taken the initiative of 'less-paper' functioning as now, within IQAC, communication is done only through emails. This has reduced paper consumption substantially. The nature club of the College educates students on the concept of carbon neutrality through TED talks and videos. The College also checks and ensures that every vehicle coming into the campus is 'Pollution Under Check' certified.
- Hazardous Waste Management: We, being a predominantly commerce College, do not result in the production of any hazardous waste. Hence, no provision for hazardous waste management is required.
- **E-waste Management:** The College has entered into a contract with an agency for e-waste management under which an *Ecobin* is installed to collect the e-waste, which is then bought over by the agency. As a result, we move from 'Waste to Wealth'. We try to refill the printer cartridges as many times as possible. This optimum use of printer cartridges helps us to reduce e-waste. Besides the use of CDs is now almost negligible.
- Tree Plantation: The College has taken due efforts to plant trees in the campus making it lush green. The NSS unit of the College is perennially active in tree plantation activities in the vicinity. This helps in spreading awareness and importance of trees even among the non-NSS members of the institute. During last three years, around 500 potted plants have been added to the College's credit. Herbal and medicinal garden is nurtured in one corner to educate students for the same. Workshops on terrarium, bonsai plants and bottle gardening concept are on the go.
- Certificate Course in Environmental Education: The College has entered into a MOU with Sanjeevani Samajik Seva Sanstha and has started a certificate course in environmental education.
- **No-Smoking Zone:** The entire College campus is observed as a no-smoking zone.
- Quality Monitoring: It is the practice of the College to check the quality of potable water and also to review the levels of air, water and noise pollution in its environment and also temperature monitoring is done.

• <u>Nature Trails:</u> In order to provide a deep insight into environment and nature, the students are often taken on nature trails to 'Sanjay Gandhi National Park' and to 'Vishnu Baag'.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years, which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

Our College believes in continuous overall up-gradation of its performance and quality enhancement. New programs and activities are initiated and implemented for the problems, which the present system is unable to resolve. Thus over a period of time, we have started with many problem-oriented, need-based innovative programs that are given below:

- 1) <u>Flipped Classroom:</u> The College believes in walking the path of modern teaching techniques and hence adopted the practice of 'Flipped Classroom', wherein the knowledge is disseminated to students beyond the walls of classrooms through online medium. Four teachers were sent to NIT, Warangal to take the training for the same. This practice is started by some teachers and others will soon follow. It ensures that students do not miss out on the content of the lectures missed due to emergencies or illness. Hence, the ills of 'ABSENTISM' are controlled. Above all, it is a medium through which students always remain connected with the teachers.
- 2) <u>Kindle Lab:</u> To satisfy the increasing e-reading appetite of the students, the College has added a 'Kindle Lab' to the existing infrastructure of the College campus. This enables the students to gain access to an ocean of books electronically.
- 3) <u>OMR Attendance System:</u> The College has implemented Optical Mark Recognition (OMR) system of attendance record keeping in order to bring in transparency and labour saving.
- 4) <u>Happiness Index:</u> In an attempt to carry out 360 degree appraisal, the College has undertaken the practice of evaluating the satisfaction levels of all its stakeholders through a structured feedback mechanism. This will measure their satisfaction levels as far as College infrastructure, services and facilities are concerned.
- 5) Online Admission (along with Payment Gateway): The College brought transparency and ease in its admission system by introducing online admission facility along with payment gateway. Again, moving from 'Brick to Click', which solved the problem of crowding in the campus during admission season and also saving on time and labour.
- 6) <u>Digital Locker Facility:</u> On the lines of digital locker facility provided by the Government of India, the College has initiated the practice of preserving several records through cloud repository system in electronic form, thereby mitigating the inherent risk associated with paper form.
- 7) Enrichment Courses: The College believes in imparting additional knowledge to the students, beyond the curriculum framed by the University. Our collaborations with various national and international agencies like Academy of Digital Arts (ADA), Association of Certified Chartered Accounts (ACCA, UK), Skyes and Ray Equities Ltd. etc. are some of the efforts in this direction. The College also has tied up with the Institute of Company Secretaries of India

- (ICSI), Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) and Consumer Guidance Society of India (CGSI). The College also offers diploma courses in Banking and Finance as well as in Travel and Tourism.
- 8) **Band Connectivity:** As the College strives to keep its students connected and updated, the College has installed a system of Band App Connectivity, which serves as a Notice Board. This helps in notifying students in an easy and timely and inexpensive manner.
- 9) <u>Information Kiosk:</u> The College has put up information kiosks whereby students on campus have access to details like their attendance records, results, notices etc.
- 10) <u>Live Lab:</u> In an attempt to enlighten the students with their potentialities as well as inculcating values, beliefs within them, the College has come up with '*Live Lab*'. The '*Live Lab*' offers a certificate course of four months on life skills enabling holistic development of students.

7.3 Best Practices

1. TITLE: 'VIDYOTEJAK'- A scheme for economically deprived and for meritorious students

2. GOALS-

The following are few objectives of 'VIDYOTEJAK' scheme:

- I. To extend a helping hand to the economically weaker students.
- II. To reduce the dropout rate among College students due to financial constraints.
- III. To acknowledge the meritorious students.

3. **CONTEXT-**

Our management, the Kandivli Education Society, came up with a novel idea of helping the economically weaker students and rewarding the meritorious students. This gave birth to 'Vidyotejak' scheme, which is an initiative to fulfill the goal of inclusive education.

Six years ago, KES' management resoluted to spend roughly 2% of its annual revenue for the scheme. This comes to around INR 40 Lakhs each year being spent towards 'VIDYOTEJAK' scheme across all the institutions run by the management. This magnanimous gesture by the Management has been well taken and applauded by the society. Providing all possible support to the students' education is not only a help or charity but is also a powerful tool of investing in education.

4. **DETAILS OF THE PRACTICE-**

This scheme has two facets- extending financial help to the needy students and acknowledging the meritorious students.

Details of Vidyotejak scheme for the last four years:

5. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS-

Vidyotejak has succeeded in providing financial help to 367 students during last three years. The scheme is a good gesture by the management of the College. This scheme has established a benchmark as participative charity, for other institutions and has earned the KES family, the goodwill of 'Responsible and Responsive Management'.

6. **PROBLEMS-**

While implementing, the scheme was not free from problems and operational difficulties.

- i. A sense of embarrassment and shyness prevented many genuine students to come forwards and avail the scheme.
- ii. Probable misuse of the scheme by undeserving students.

However, still we have a sense of satisfaction of doing a yeoman's service as we sail through in implementing the scheme judiciously.

7. **CONCLUSION-**

The scheme 'VIDYOTEJAK' was started with a noble intention to extend a helping hand to the economically weaker students. All along these years, we experience immense contentment seeing the gratifying faces of the needy students as they step ahead in their graduation gowns, ready to be awarded the degree. The tearfull eyes of their parents silently express a sense of gratitude towards the College. We feel entranced to see that this investment in education is helping in fruition of societal needs.

BEST PRACTICE NO. 2

1. TITLE: 'Gratitude Day' organised by students

2. GOALS-

The practice of 'Gratitude Day' was started with the following objectives:

- I. To acknowledge the efforts of the Class IV employees.
- II. To inculcate a sense of 'dignity of labour'.
- III. To sensitize the students to develop a caring attitude towards the Class IV employees.
- IV. To make the students realise the labour the Class IV employees put in.

3. CONTEXT-

We are living in the land of 'Bhagwat Gita', which advocates the humanity to practice 'Karma'. One of the many hurdles faced by the modern society is the tendency of the people to discriminate others on the basis of the status of their work. Some of the most important job that require lot of commitment and dedication, are often looked down upon and people carrying out such jobs are given least respect and care. This social stigma needs to be contemplated. Therefore, the observance of Gratitude Day has been an example of humanity to the society.

4. **DETAILS OF THE PRACTICE-**

We believe in shaping and moulding our students to be worthy citizens. In order to instill the concept of dignity of labour and humanitarian spirit, the College successfully organizes 'Gratitude Day'. It is a day, when students show a mark of love, affection and respect to Class IV employees comprising of peons, watchmen, housekeeping staff and canteen staff.

It is the Social Impact Committee, which organizes this day as an event. The students collect some minimum amount of money with the underlying idea "Compassion without Compulsion" i.e. no student is forced to contribute. It is totally voluntary on

the part of the students. Similar enthusiasm is reflected in the contributions made by the Teaching and Non-teaching staff of the College. Money collected is utilized to purchase products, which would be graciously given to all the Class IV employees on the day of the event. The celebration begins with the felicitation of the Class IV employees in the presence of the Principal, teaching staff, non-teaching staff and students. This event offers a chance to all the teaching and non-teaching staff of the College to express gratitude towards the services provided by the Class IV employees all through the year. The Class IV employees are individually invited onto the stage, where the students share their thoughts about the staff and in turn the Class IV employees are asked to share their feelings. The formal function is followed by lunch, affectionately served by the students themselves. The care and affection experienced by the Class IV employees makes them feel dignified and rewarded. In return, students realize and recognize the 'Dignity of Labour'.

5. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS-

The concept of Gratitude Day has succeeded in structuring a sense of togetherness and in inculcating the value of equality among the students as they willingly make contribution by compromising on their pocket money. The students also tend to develop good rapport with the Class IV employees, which indirectly helps the students as interpersonal relationship improves. The Class IV employees are also overwhelmed by this kind gesture shown towards them by the students, which motivates them to go out of their way and help the students and also make them more dedicated towards their work. The event has led to the development of leadership and organizing skills among the students as they take minimum guidance from the staff and handle the event on their own. By doing so, a sense of respect is inculcated among the students for Class IV employees. It is a process of two way success for the employees as well as students.

6. PROBLEMS-

In such gratifying activity, no problems are faced.

7. CONCLUSION-

"Gratitude is a fruit which does not grow on ordinary tree". We at KES' Shroff College are keen on transforming the lives of such ordinary trees into extraordinary ones. The acceptance of Gratitude Day portrays our success in being able to transform more and more students' attitudes each year. This quality of gratitude imbibed by students during their College life, not only stays and flourishes with them forever, but also leads to contented lives and relationships throughout their lives.

College IQAC's Post Accreditation Initiatives

The exercise of previous NAAC concluded with 'A-Grade' and 3.16 CGPA on a four point scale. This was certainly encouraging as our efforts led to a smile on everybody's face. However, the end of the first cycle lead to beginning of the second as it came with more challenges; a challenge of 'keep doing', a challenge of 'doing better than the best', a challenge to innovate, a challenge to enhance the quality further. It was also a challenge to emerge as a leader and a trendsetter in academic arena. With this realization, we began our work for the second cycle.

The journey through 2012-13 till date has been characterized by several internal and external changes. These changes were in the form of new learning; new activities and new beginning and also in the form of horizontal growth and a vertical up-gradation.

IQAC played a pivotal role in the past four and a half years and has put forth many new ideas. As our focus has always been a student centric, it is our duty to send him/her back in the society as a well groomed, educated and responsible citizen. Following is a brief presentation about the post-accreditation initiatives the IQAC has undertaken under the guidance of the Principal of our College and the management i.e. Kandivli Education Society.

Initiative-I

Rejuvenated IQAC: The post-accreditation initiatives of IQAC began with reshuffling and reframing the very structure of IQAC of the College. We have a three tire IQAC now. The base level of IQAC is the Core Committee; wherein criterion wise committees are formed with a good number of members in each committee and a senior-most teacher among the group as the Criterion-head. The Core Committee takes care of data pooling and data management at the very criterion level. The second tire of IQAC is the Working Committee, where all the criterion heads are exofficio members. In addition to them, is the Technical Committee, which along with the NAAC Coordinator together ensures the smooth working of IQAC throughout the year. The highest level of IOAC is in the form of a Full Bench Committee, where all criterion heads are ex-officio members. This body is quiet extensive and has incorporated members from all the stakeholders. This body comprises of two external experts, two representatives from our Management, two representatives from parents, two student-representatives and also representatives from teaching and administrative staff. The Principal is the ex-officio Chairman of the Full Bench IQAC and the IQAC Coordinator is Member Secretary.

Each committee regularly meets and maintains minutes of the meetings in electronic form. The three tire structure of IQAC has certainly helped us for inclusive administration, in getting a wider perception and in smooth implementation of the policies decided in the Full Bench meeting.

IQAC has also received grant from the University Grants Commission (UGC) for the up-gradation of its infrastructure. The grant has been fully utilized by providing a

separate room for College IQAC with necessary office infrastructure and an office staff for the same.

IQAC also initiated a very innovative idea of 'Paperless Functioning'. Thus, every member in IQAC communicates with others only through e-mails. This has not only saved paper, but also has many other tangible results. It made IQAC members friendlier with computers; it also helped them to reduce their dependency on office staff. Besides, communication within IQAC has become fast and easily retrievable whenever necessary.

Initiative-II

Series of Audits: Today's era is an era of scrutiny. We strongly believe in our abilities and also in our actions. However, we wanted to ensure that our abilities are used optimally and actions are put into right direction. For the same, we ensured this with a third party impersonal scrutiny. Therefore, the College IQAC decided to go for periodic scanning of our system through various bodies.

The College IQAC had recommended and ensured that the following series of audits were undertaken in the College over a span of four and a half years:

- **1. ISO Audit:** Our College is an ISO-certified institute. This certification has not only helped us to get a brand value but it has also helped us to put our management system in proper functioning. The ISO team regularly visits our College every year, and their comments / audit-reports have always been helpful for us to take effective measures in day-to-day administration of the College.
- **2. Academic Audit:** NAAC accreditation is basically an academic audit of the institution, which takes place once in five years. Considering that this time gap is too long, the College IQAC decided to have at least one mid-term Academic Audit between the two cycles of NAAC accreditation process. We therefore initiated a voluntary Academic Audit in April 2014 undertaken by a team headed by Prof. K Venkatramani, Ex-Principal, Ex-Registrar of University of Mumbai and currently the Registrar of D.Y. Patil autonomous University, and Dr. Parvathi Venkatesh, Principal of Mulund College of Commerce as a member. Recommendations of this committee have helped us and our management as well to re-strategize our developmental plans for the future.

Apart from this Academic Audit volunteered by us, University of Mumbai, as our parent body, made academic audit mandatory for every College. This audit was to be undertaken by the University itself. We participated in this audit as well. We have already sent the SSR to University of Mumbai in August 2015 and now we are awaiting the visit of University Peer Team for same.

3. Energy Audit: The energy audit of our College building was done by M/s. Bhuva & Associates. It has helped us to reduce electricity consumption. As per the recommendations of this audit, we have change our policy of using conventional bulbs and tube lights to energy-efficient LEDs in phased manner. Moreover, this audit has also made us environment conscious and therefore management has now initiated the process of taping solar energy wherever possible.

- **4. Green Audit:** The green audit is done in our campus. Nature Club of our College helps in creating environmental consciousness.
- **5. Administrative Audit:** As we had done academic audit to scrutinize our academic performance, the College office also initiated Administrative Audit. Shri Amin, ExRegistrar, N.K. College, Malad; and Shri Shinde, Ex-Registrar, Patkar College, Goregaon, visited our College and conducted a thorough scrutiny of the overall functioning, system of filing, data storage and data retrieval mechanism of the College office. It was done in two phases. This audit has helped us to reshuffle portfolios of certain office staff members for the better delivery of job and efficient manpower management. It built the spirit, morale and camaraderie amongst the office staff members.

Initiative III

Theme of the Year: Theme provides a special focus. IQAC initiated the concept of having a theme for each academic year. The selection of theme aims to enhance the delivery of services to our prime stakeholder- the Students to the best of our abilities. Following year-wise themes decided by the College IQAC were internalized actively in the College.

Initiative-IV

Standard Operational Procedure (SOPs): The effective implementation of any activity or programme depends on pre-planning and preparation. Standard Operational Procedure (SOPs) is nothing but a detailed guideline about the preparation and execution of every activity. This is a tailor-made guideline, and can be followed by even a person unknown to the activity. SOPs are made for almost every major activity of the College right from the admission process, examination process, teaching-learning schedule, day-to-day administration, the procedure of grievance redressal, and even the programmes organized by various associations. SOPs, therefore, play a role of 'to do list' and can be easily transferred from one person to another without compromising the quality outcome.

Initiative-V

Student-centric Activities: We strongly believe that the Student is the reason and purpose of our very existence and also of an institute, and hence College IQAC decided and implemented several student-centric programmes.

- 1) K-Skool: It runs soft-skill development programmes making a student employable.
- 2) Introduction of New Courses: In last four years, many certificate courses, diploma and other full time courses have been initiated. Some elective subjects have also been introduced. These courses and elective subjects have provided academic flexibility to the students. This has been notable feature of our College vis-a vis other colleges in the vicinity.

3) Industrial Visits (IVs): Education is incomplete without exposure to the real world. Therefore, we have made industrial visits more as an academic oriented activity. We have taken Industrial Visits to different level with different durations and for different purposes. Industrial Visits for both short-term and long-term as well as at local, national and international level were undertaken. Almost 85% of our students have been exposed to some or the other Industrial Visits (IVs) every year. This has certainly helped our students in enhancing and widening their knowledge horizons. Besides, it has also inculcated certain values like co-operation, togetherness and group dynamics within them.

Initiative VI

Exhaustive Feedback: Introspection is one of the best tools to improve and an assisted introspection with a feedback analysis on the desk helps it further. The College IQAC has established a structured mechanism to take exhaustive feedback predominantly from the students. Feedback on every paradigm is undertaken. Feedback covers the entire gamut of the teaching-learning process. Besides, College has also taken feedback from peers during the workshops and conferences organized in the College. At times, our employers, who select our students in campus interview, are also approached for their feedback on our students. This has helped us to reorient ourselves as an institution.

Initiative VII

Developing Research Culture among Students: Higher education and research go hand in hand. Moreover, developing research culture among students is the need of the hour. Keeping this in mind, we intended to inculcate the very spirit of research amongst the students during their under-graduate education itself. This push has encouraged students to continue with research even after their graduation and post-graduation.

We are the pioneers to initiate the concept called 'Students' Conference' at intercollegiate level. We organize a student conference every year on different themes related to commerce and finance. In these conferences, only students from various colleges are allowed to present their research papers. Following table gives a detail about Students' Conferences organized year wise, with themes and the number of student participants in each year.

Initiative IX

Taking College Programmes to Higher Level: Spinning stories of success since 1989 the College stands tall, and it is the right time to venture beyond the regional boundaries. We, therefore, decided to stretch our certain key events up to the national levels. Our alumni who organizes the inter collegiate sports and cultural festival 'Chakrawyuha', successfully for the last 20 years at the University level, is now being organized at national level for the last 2 years. Similarly, 'Annapurna Mahotsav', a programme encouraging the amateur entrepreneurs transcending College boundaries is now organized at an intercollegiate level. Our self-finance courses have also joined the trend of organizing exclusive intercollegiate events specific to certain group of students associated with specific courses. *Oasis, Sapphire, Monnaie, Mambozz,* and *Artbeat* are dedicated intercollegiate programmes for the students of BMS, BSC (IT), BAF-BFM-BIM-BBI, BMM and BA respectively.

In an endevour to expose our students to the intercollegiate and National level, we have not ignored our own introvert, but yet talented students. In order to elicit their hidden talents, we went a step ahead to organized programme as competition called 'Antarang' exclusively for our own students within the College campus.

Initiative X

Addition of Infrastructure: The progress of an institution is largely gauged by its growth, both vertical and horizontal. As we are putting our efforts to reach greater heights academically, we are not behind in our horizontal expansion. As the demand

ratio is increasing is passing year, we added more classrooms, extra office space and additional physical infrastructure required for students. Likewise, constructing the new building for the same reflects the proactive vision of our management. Thus, we have not lagged behind in catering to the infrastructural support.

Initiative XI

Bonding with society: Student is an integral part of the society. There is a greater responsibility on educational institutions to mould each student into a sensible and responsible citizen. Though this job is beyond any curriculum, but is essential. Realizing our responsibility, the College through its student-volunteers strived to connect with the society by undertaking the following activities:

- 1) Joy of Giving Forthnight: 'Joy of Giving' forthnight, as the name suggests, encourages students to enjoy the joy of giving as they contribute something for the cause of society. The students generously donate brand new articles/items of daily utilities and then collectively hand it over to two orphanages. By doing so, the College tries to sensitize our students towards social responsibility and compassion to the underprivileged.
- 2) Gratitude Day: Gratitude Day is a day where students express their gratitude towards the helping hands of the College who consistently provide support services all round the year. On this day, students through this unique practice felicitate and honor the support staff with gifts and serve them lunch after the ceremony. Thus, we try to instill dignity of labour thereof.
- **3) Woolen clothes Distribution:** The College has also taken an initiative to extend help to the homeless people who are regrettably forced to live without shelter. Our students distributed woolen blankets during winters to such street-dwellers thereby protecting them from painful winter nights.
- **4**) **Traffic Awareness Rally:** The students of the College sum up for a rally to spread awareness about the importance of obeying traffic rules, wearing helmets while riding two-wheelers, no drunk en driving, wearing seat belt while driving four- wheelers etc.
- **5**) **Beautification of Kandivli Railway Station:** Leading a helping hand to Indian railways and also fulfilling Institutional Social Responsibility, the College took up the mantle of beautification and cleanliness of Platform No. of Kandivli Railway Station. By participating in this activity, we fulfill the national objective of Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan.
- **6) NSS Blood Donation Camp:** The NSS unit of the College organized a blood donation camp, twice a year.

Initiative XII

Constant View and Review: The College IQAC has established a mechanism of a constant review and introspection before, during and after the activity. In order to meet the requisite standards, we regularly organize a series of meetings. For example, there are regular staff meetings before and after each event. Besides, staff meetings are also conducted for mid-term review as well as term-end meetings. IQAC conducts many core committee, working committee and full bench committee meetings throughout the year. Similarly, each department is also organizing meetings at their levels ensuring that departmental activities are well planned, executed and implemented flawlessly.

College's IQAC's

Action Taken Report on the Recommendation made by the Peer Team of Previous Accreditation

Besides these initiatives, we have paid attention to the every recommendation made by the Peer Team of the previous accreditation process. Following is a brief review of Peer Team's recommendations vis-à-vis our action taken report on those recommendations.

Recommendation I: Up-grading knowledge and skill of both teaching and non-teaching staff on a continuous basis.

Action Taken Report on Recommendation I: IQAC of our College strongly believes in dynamism of a system. We are aware about 'Perform or Perish' rule of the new system. Hence, in order to safeguard ourselves, we ensured that the very people-Human Resource of the institution will tread the path of academic, skill and knowledge upgradation. Apart from institutional push, staff members have also volunteered to upgrade themselves. As a collective result, the following is a summary of overall outcome of these efforts:

- 1. 02 members have completed their research and have been awarded Ph.D. degree; while 12 members are registered for Ph.D.
- 2. 10 members have completed M.Phil, NET/SET.
- 3. 03 members have completed their MBA.
- 4. 20 members have done 20 minor research projects.
- 5. 310 members have attended national and international conferences/ seminars/ workshops.
- 6. 174 Research papers/ articles have been published.
- 7. 20 Books have been authored by our 6 teachers
- 8. 09 members have up-graded their academic qualifications
- 9. Even three members from non teaching staff have up-graded their academic qualifications

Recommendation II: Self-appraisal of teachers and students' feedback for quality enhancement is a notable feature along with which feedback from academic peers and present/ potential employers may be collected.

Action Taken Report on Recommendation II: A sound feedback system enables us to introspect our past and guides us to plan our future. We have thus ensured following levels of feedback mechanism:

- 1. Students' feedback on teaching.
- 2. Students' feedback on curriculum.
- 3. Students' feedback on College infrastructure.
- 4. Students' feedback on College day-to-day administration.
- 5. Students' feedback on library functioning.
- 6. Besides, employer's feedback on our students who are placed during their campus interview has also been procured.
- 7. In addition to the above, feedback from our peers has been regularly taken post conference/ seminar organized by us.

Recommendation III: Strengthening the research culture.

Action Taken Report on Recommendation III: Higher education is all about research and in order to inculcate research culture, we have initiated students' conference concept, which has been already elaborated above. Besides, our College has started University of Mumbai Research center affiliated to University of Mumbai in under the guidance of 3 research guides, 8 students are in process of completing their enrollment for the research leading to Ph.D. degree. Besides this, a Research Center in Business Economics is proposed.

In the same way, 1 staff member has completed UGC sponsored minor research and 1 UGC sponsored minor research is going on. There are also 6 minor research sponsored by University of Mumbai and 12 minor research sponsored by our management- Kandivli Education Society. All these efforts are quiet visible in form of 161 research papers, which have been published in double blind, peer-reviewed journals/ Conference Proceedings in the last four years.

Recommendation IV: Strengthening the Alumni Association further

Action Taken Report on Recommendation IV: The College Alumni Association is a registered body under Society's Registration Act of Government of Maharashtra. The Alumni Association is very active throughout the year. The Association sponsors on an average 5 students every year who are financially unable to take care of their education. The Association also sponsors one important inter-collegiate cricket tournament and it is also a main force in organizing inter-collegiate sports/ cultural festival named as 'Chakrawyuha' for the past 20+ years. The Association has also put in its strength behind taking 'Chakrawyuha' to a national level. The culmination of these efforts were seen when the College organized a mega get-together of all the exstudents of our College since 1991 wherein more than 2000 students attended and engrossed themselves down the memory lane. Many ex-students were amazed by noticing the exponential growth of the institution in both academic and infrastructural terms.

Recommendation V: Increasing expenditure on books and journals

Action Taken Report on Recommendation V: Each and every penny collected as Library Fees is spent in procuring the books and journals. We strongly believe in a formula that Library Fees is equal to Library Budget. Thus, we ensure that entire library fees collected is spent to procure books and reference material. The Library Committee is very active throughout the year. Annual book exhibition is one of the striking features of our library. Through this exhibition, publishers exhibit their latest quality academic products and thus provide a golden opportunity to our students, teaching and office staff to purchase this learning resource for their personal usage or to recommend to procure these books for the College library. This exercise has really helped. The following table gives a brief information about the number of books procured by the library in the last four and a half years:

Besides, the College library has also put in efforts to enrich the learning resources available through several schemes like 'INFLIBNET', Database, member of Taxman.com, IndianTax.com.

Recommendation VI: Mobilizing financial resources from the apex funding agencies and through consultancy services and corporate partnership

Action Taken Report on Recommendation VI: The College has established a planning and development board on the guidelines by the UGC. This board has successfully managed to get UGC developmental funds to the tune of Rs. 49 Lakhs. In addition to this, the College has also received separate grants of Rs. 3 Lakhs for IQAC and Rs. 3 Lakhs under XIIth plan.

Recommendation VII: Encouraging increased student participation in extracurricular activities at the state/ national level

Action Taken Report on Recommendation VII: Our College management is very generous in promoting co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The management has sanctioned a special fund of Rs. 5 Lakhs each year, exclusively for Cultural, Gymkhana and NCC Associations. Students are provided with sports kit, tracksuits as well as with special diet. Appointment of dedicated coaches, choreographers, Drama Director and a separate teacher for NCC studies has attracted many students to extracurricular activities. The College also bears the expenditure of students' travel and participation fees for their participation in inter-collegiate events. As a result of this, our overall participation of students in curricular and extra-curricular activities has increased substantially. This can be well seen from the number of accolades our College has received in the past four and a half years. Antarang, an intra-College competition is also organized to expose the hidden talent of every student of the College.

Recommendation VIII: Introducing more job-oriented courses

Action Taken Report on Recommendation VIII: In order to align ourselves the with changing market trends and also to be competitive, the College has started many certificate, diploma and degree courses in last four years. These additions have certainly made more options available for our students. We also have tie-ups with Kashida fashion designing institute, Aptech- a computer institute and Arena- a multimedia institute. These tie-ups certainly equip students with new opportunities to make them more employable. In addition to this, our own K-skool is also taking care of soft-skill development through a structured training programme which every student has to take during his/her tenure of graduation.

Recommendation IX: Developing linkages with industries:

Action Taken Report on Recommendation IX: The College has developed linkages with following industries/institutions:

1) **Infinity Travel and Tourism**: We have established a linkage with 'Infinity Travel and Tourism', Charkop, Kandivli (W) for travel and tourism training for our students. Students undertaking Certificate Course of the College in Travel and Tourism are sent to this firm for internship.

- 2) **NESCO IT Campus:** A linkage with myinsuranceclub.com and the College has provided a platform for the students to get summer job/internship and learn hand on training I insurance field.
- 3) Mahindra and Mahindra: As an activity of DLLE, our students go to Mahindra and Mahindra tractor unit to get hands on training in office and fieldwork of manufacturing unit.
- 4) **BSE NSDC: A course was conducted by Bombay Stock Exchange** for our students in 'Banking and Financial services.

Recommendation X: MOUs may be made with some professional bodies and research institutes

Action Taken Report on Recommendation X: The College has made MOUs with following institutions:

- 1) ACCA: Memorandum of Understanding between the College and Association of Chartered Company Accountants (ACCA), UK has been established to give students international exposure in the field of Accountancy and Finance in association with FinPlan. The course gives extensive coverage of Accounts with respect to International Finance Reporting Standards (IFRS).
- 2) **ADA:** Memorandum of Understanding between the College and 'Academy of Digital Arts' (ADA) is established to give students practical learning exposure in digital learning, animation, graphics, film technology and media studies.
- 3) **Kashida Fashion Design:** Memorandum of Understanding between the College and 'Kashida' is executed to give students of the College, especially to girls an opportunity to earn with learn, to prepare them an entrepreneur. This course gives an exposure on fashion designing and jewelry making.
- 4) **ATS Learning Solutions:** Memorandum of Understanding between the College and 'ATS Learning Solutions' is in place to run Microsoft Courses.
- 5) Endeavour: Memorandum of Understanding between the College and 'Endeavour' is executed to undertake special training for the students to train them in mathematics, logical reasoning, quantitative techniques and vocabulary. Students are also trained for group discussion and personal interview.
- 6) **CSR Agency:** A memorandum of Understanding between the College and CSR Agency has been executed to run a certificate course in 'Corporate Social responsibility'.
- 7) **Skyes and Rayes:** Memorandum of Understanding between the College and 'Skyes and Rayes' is in place for a course in 'Certified Financial Planner' (CFL).
- 8) Sanjeevani Samajik Seva Sanstha: Memorandum of Understanding between the College and 'Sanjeevani Samajik Seva Sanstha' is signed for providing Certificate course in Environmental Education.
 - The main objective of this course is to sensitize students on environmental issues through workshops and training. Composting, waste management, use of Solar energy and carbon neutrality are few areas this certificate course will emphasis.

33. Teaching methods adopted to improve student learning

The department predominantly follows the traditional chalk and talk method but is now increasingly adopting an array of latest technological tools and methods in order to enhance student-learning experience.

- With ICT —enabled classrooms, the faculty members give an audio-visual dimension to their lectures. Use of power point presentation and relevant videoclippings act as visual stimulators that improve student learning.
- The use of study material in the form of handouts and booklets help students in practicing and mastering the subject
- The law faculty organizes discussion on current issues and subject related case studies
- The department involves students in budgetary discussion during the budget session and general awareness talks are also conducted
- The department also believes in the concept of teaching beyond classroom in which students are encouraged to take help of various relevant online educational

- resources/learning platforms such as Moodle, Doodle, Coursera etc. Modern techniques like web casting are also used
- The faculty members inculcate the practice of reading newspapers among the students and discuss current issues and topics. Newspapers like Economic Times and Indian Express are used in classroom teaching.
- Various educational tours provide exposure to students. Some such tours are visits to manufacturing units, service sector, visit to police station, high court, banks, RBI, BSE, Juvenile court.
- Members from the department conduct bridge course and remedial lectures, which help the weak students to cope with the exams.
- Members from the department identify slow learners and guide them with the subject through Peer to peer system
- Similarly, advanced learners are identified and persuade them to refer reference books related to the subject. On similar lines peer to peer system is adopted to enhance their knowledge and results
- Feedback sessions are held at the end of the lectures to ensure students' understanding of the subject matter taught.
- Use of Language laboratory has enhanced listening and vocabulary among the students



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


